#### THAW'S MILLIONS HAVE FAILED TO THWART CANADIAN JUSTICE

**HEAS CORPUS WRIT SUSTAINED AND FUGITIVE HANDED

Sherbrooke, Que., Sept. 4.—The writ of habeas corpus brought on behalf of Chief of Police Bouchard of Coaticook, who arrested Thaw after his flight from Matewan, has been sustained, and the Hutchinsons handed down decision late yesterday afternoon. The writ had been granted by Superior Judge Hutchinson on the application of Samuel J. J. of Montreal, chief of counsel for the New York state interest. #### ROOPS ARE ORDERED OUT TO PREVENT BETTING ON HORSES

**COUNTY AUTHORITIES TAKING NO STEPS TO PREVENT GAM-

The troops were ordered out by Governor Ralston, after he had received information that the track officials were permitting gambling and that the county authorities were doing little to prevent it.

#### MAIL BREAKING INSTRUMENTS WERE CONCEALED IN HIS CELL

**WENT ATTEMPT BY CLARK AND DAVIS, THE MURDERERS OF  
CONSTABLE ARCHIBALD, TO BREAK OUT OF  
THE PENITENTIARY.**

New Westminster, Aug. 30.—The latest developments in the attempted jail break at the provincial jail a short time ago, when Clark and Davis, the alleged murderers of Constable Archibald of Vancouver, made a desperate break for liberty, reveals the fact that the hacksawed to saw their way to apparent freedom had been hidden in that institution for some length of time. It appears that Davis had served a previous term at this jail, having been sentenced to six months. During his incarceration he made the acquaintance of a prisoner, later sentenced for the same offense, who informed him of the whereabouts of the two hacksaws which, in some mysterious manner, had been smuggled into the jail. As Davis' term was about to end, he paid very little heed to this information at the time. After he was arrested by the Vancouver police on the charge of murder he then thought of the incident. By a peculiar circumstance, Davis was placed in the identical cell in which the hacksaws were hidden. He told the result of his find to Clark and the jail break was planned. Clark was struck with the scheme and the attempted jail break resulted. Guard Day, who was the most seriously injured in the encounter, will probably be discharged from the hospital next week. Also Guard Hibbens will be on duty next week.

#### HUNDRED INJURED IN REAR-END COLLISION

**Thirteen Bodies Already Taken  
from the Wreck of the Ex-  
cursion Trains.**

New Haven, Conn., Sept. 4.—A terrible rear end collision occurred yesterday on the New York & New Haven Railway a short distance from Wallingford depot. There were two passenger trains, both heavily crowded, with returning excursionists when by some error of signals the second train ran into the rear of the first at high speed, completely wrecking both. It is estimated that at least twenty were killed and over a hundred injured, some of the latter fatally. Thirteen dead have already been taken from the wreck.

New Haven, Sept. 4.—(Later.)—This morning the total is twenty-one dead and five dying as a result of the wreck yesterday on the New Haven Railway. The company now faces a public enquiry into the causes of the disaster.

#### VISCOUNT HALDANE'S ADDRESS SETS FORTH BRITISH POLICY

**HIS STATEMENT BEFORE AMERICAN BAR ASSOCIATION DE-  
CLARED TO BE STAMPED WITH APPROVAL OF THE  
BRITISH FOREIGN MINISTER**

Philadelphia, Sept. 4.—Francis Rawle, a leading lawyer of this city who attended the annual meeting of the American Bar Association at Montreal, declares that the address of Viscount Haldane, Lord High Chancellor of England, before that body was an authorized statement of the international policy of Great Britain.  
In this address Lord Haldane concerned himself in a large measure to the unity of nations, and particularly those nations of the Anglo-Saxon race, and their working together for the good of the world and its peace betterment. Mr. Rawle declares the whole address to have been stamped with the approval of the British Foreign minister, Sir Edward Grey.

#### LOCAL CONCERN PREPARING FOR BUILDING ACTIVITY

**THE WESTHOLME LUMBER COMPANY SECURES ADDITIONAL  
WATERFRONTAGE AND PURCHASES A LARGE  
QUANTITY OF LUMBER.**

That there is one firm in the city with a strong conviction that Prince Rupert is rapidly approaching a period of great activity in the building line is evident from the fact it is now making preparations to be ready to handle the business that will be offered. M. Albert, manager of the Westholme Lumber Co., who returned yesterday from Victoria, announces that his firm has taken over the lease of 200 feet of additional waterfrontage here, recently held by the Swanson Bay Company. This waterfrontage is adjoining the present wharf of the Westholme Lumber Company and it is the latter firm's intention to proceed at once with the building of a substantial wharf on the newly acquired property, giving them a wharf frontage of 400 feet. The piles have already been ordered for the work. The company will also erect a suitable lumber shed. In addition to securing the Swanson Bay Company's waterfrontage, the Westholme Company has also purchased from the former about 2,000,000 feet of lumber, about half of which is already cut. The balance will be cut by the Swanson Bay Company as ordered by the Westholme Company and the entire supply will be brought to Prince Rupert as fast as it will be required.
