QUESTION AS TO NATIONALITY OF ANDREW, LAIRD OF SKIBO

BRITISH HOME SECRETARY STATES THAT CARNEGIE IS BRITISH BORN AND IS NOT KNOWN TO HAVE CHANGED HIS NATIONALITY.

London, Aug. 31.—An interesting letter on the subject of the nationality of Andrew Carnegie, written by Home Secretary McKenna, has been received by William Thorne, a Labor member of parliament, who had been persuaded by Lillian Scott-Troy, an American suffragette, to inquire why the ironmaster's name was on the parliamentary voters' register of Dornoch parish, Scotland.

As the letter hints, Mr. Carnegie may be a British subject, despite his repeated declarations that he is an American citizen, he even refusing a dukedom from King Edward on that account.

Miss Troy has brought the matter to the attention of the Marquis of Tullibardine, son of the Duke of Atholl, and has received a promise that a protest will be made in Dornoch parish on September 20 with the object of instituting an inquiry.

Miss Troy intends to accompany the Unionist leader, file the protest and then visit Skibo Castle, where Mr. Carnegie has invited a large house party, including Ambassador Page and

Oscar S. Straus. Mr. McKenna's letter reads:

My Dear Thorne: You wrote me the other day asking whether Mr. Andrew Carnegie is a British subject and suggesting that the appearance of his name on the list of Dornoch voters is sufficient evidence of his British nationality.

I am afraid I am not in a position to reply definitely. The appearance of his name on a list of voters is not conclusive as to British nationality, as occasionally persons who are not British subjects get on the lists.

So far as I know, Mr. Carnegie was born in the United Kingdom, and by virtue of this would be a British subject. Unless he has done something to divest himself of British nationality, and I have never heard that he has, he remains a British subject.

Mr. Carnegie's name is number eleven on the list of Dornoch parish, County Sutherland, in which he is described as "gentleman."

LEGAL DECISION GIVEN THAT WOMEN MAY DRESS LIKE MEN

MAGISTRATE LAYS DOWN DICTUM THAT IF A WOMAN CAN EARN MORE DRESSED AS A MAN NO LAW CAN PREVENT HER.

New York, Sept. 1.—If a woman can earn more money working as a man and masquerading in masculine attire there's no law to prevent her. It is not a crime for a woman to dress as she pleases. This is what Magistrate Voorhees said today when Katherine Clark was arraigned in the Adams street court, Brooklyn, charged with vagrancy.

Still attired in her man's suit, a blue serge, with tight fitting trousers, silk socks and silk shirt and carrying her gray cap in hand, Katherine boldly stepped before the magistrate when the case was called. In default of a \$500 bond she had been kept in the Raymond street jail since Tuesday. The girl refused to tell the magistrate her name.

"There is no law," said Judge

Voorhees, "to prevent a woman from dressing as she pleases. Doesn't Dr. Mary Walker go about every day dressed in man's clothing?"

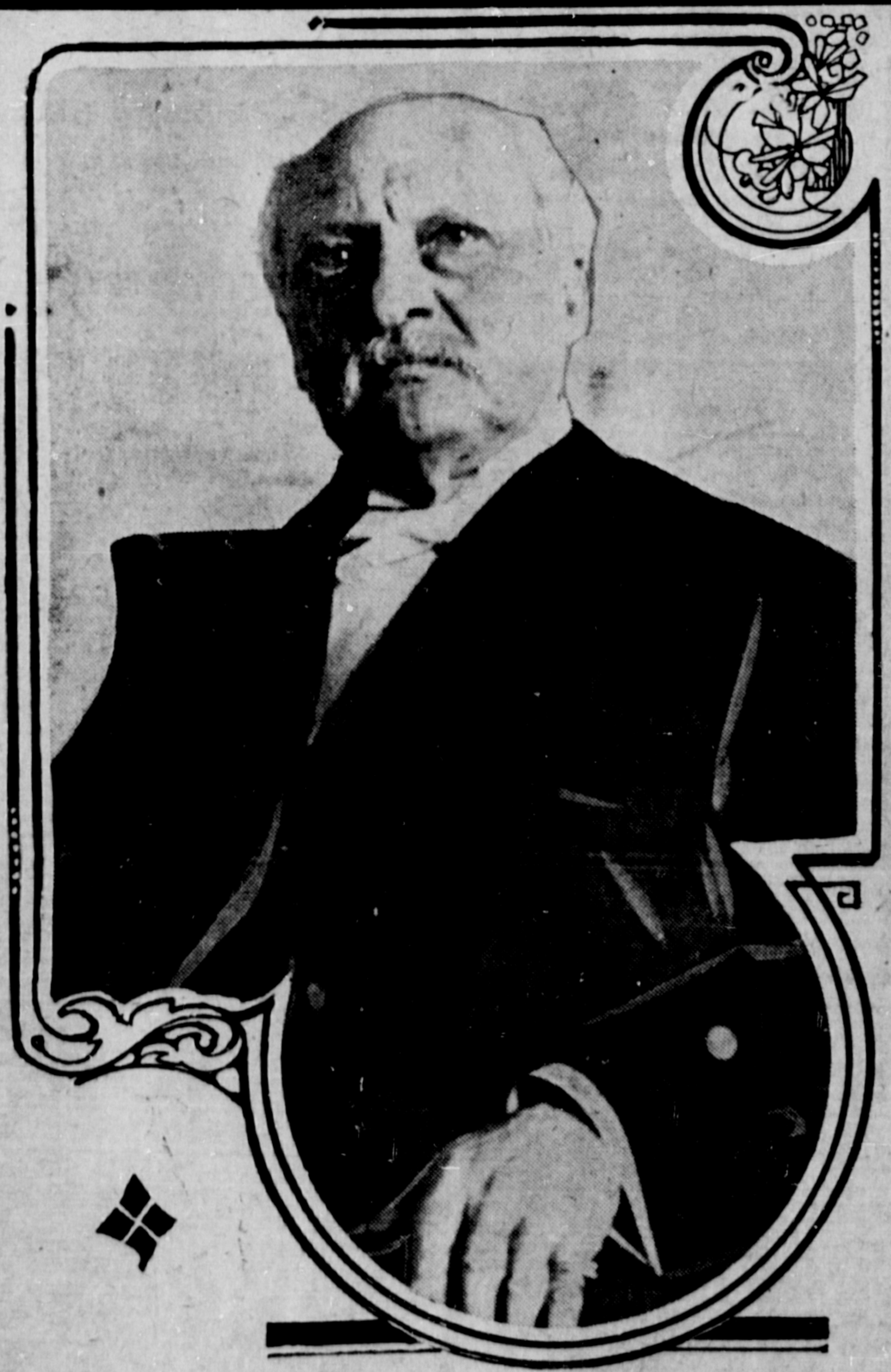
"But she has a special permit from congress," said the detective.

"See here," said Judge Voorhees, addressing the prisoner, "I can send you to jail for six months for refusing to tell your name. Will you tell me your right name and where you live, or go back to jail?"
