EXPERTS TEST COAL ON GRAHAM ISLAND

Johnson Succeeded in Interesting British Capital During His Trip to London.

Mr. J. G. Johnston, the hardy prospector, who a short time ago made a trip to London, Eng., and was very successful in interesting capital there in Graham Island coai lands, returned to Masset last week from a trip to the west coast. Mr. Wolsley, a noted coal and oil expert, accompanied Mr. Johnston on the trip. For the past three weeks they were engaged in examining coal and oil properties on the west coast belonging to a company which Mr. Johnston promoted and is heavily interested in.

Mr. Arthur Robertson took the party in his launch to West River, which is nearly ten miles south 10f the company's property, for the purpose of the geologists to see the dip and strike of the formation seams which are particularly well exposed there. From West River Mr. Johnston and Mr. Wolsley moved north until they came to the company's holdings, where after careful study and prospecting their opinion is that there is a large area of the finest quality of coal on the property, which extends from North Island south for ten miles and comprises nearly one hundred square miles of land. They brought back with them about 300 pounds of coal samples taken from the property.


