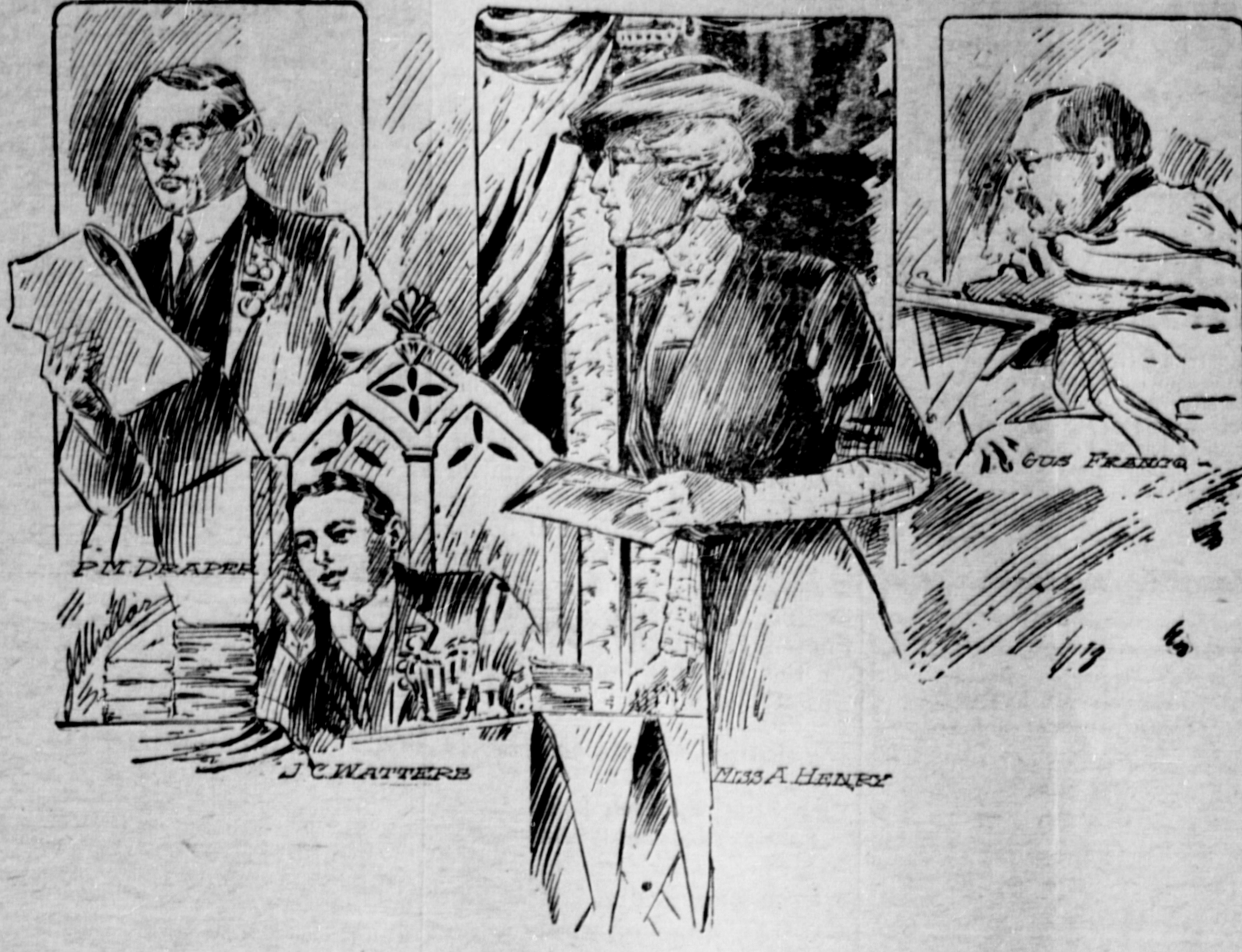

DERAILS TRAIN TO SAVE A MAN'S LIFE

Engineer Throws on Emergency Brake and Twelve Cars Go into the Ditch.

Ellensburg, Wash., Sept. 29.—In an effort to save an unknown man late last evening, Engineer Zuegler, of the eastbound Northern Pacific freight train, put on the emergency brake and sent twelve cars into the ditch.

Zuegler's train was travelling about thirty miles an hour when the searchlight showed a man walking on the track.

Finding the man made no effort to leave the track, Zuegler threw on the emergency brakes and the twelve leading cars buckled up and were derailed.

No members of the train crew were injured. The pedestrian was killed. His body is at the coroner's office here and has not been identified.

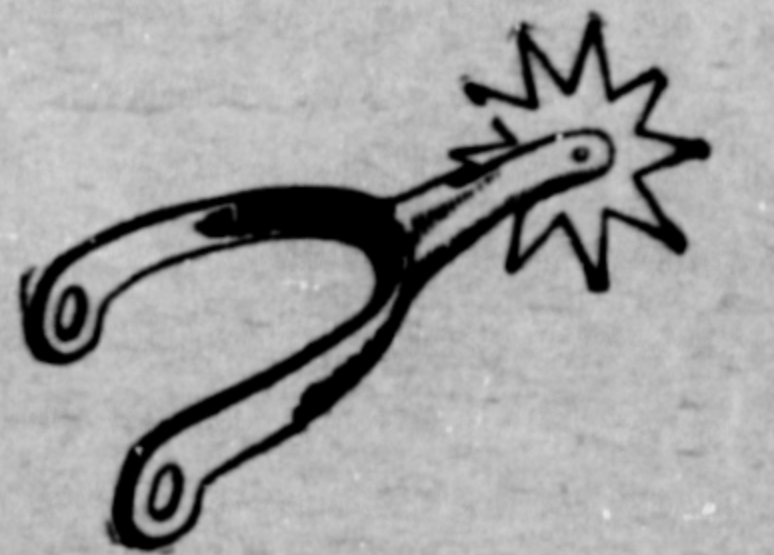
