Last week the whole country was ringing with the shouts and yells of the baseball fans, both on the battlefields, where victories were acclaimed and defeats won groans, and before the bulletin boards in all the great cities, where every play was instantaneously refforded. Foremost is Marquard, one of the stars of the National League. This southpaw pitcher was put in the box for the first game, but scored a defeat and was relieved. Schang is one of Connie Mack's pickups who sometimes develop into stars under his careful training. It was so in this case, Schang having the highest batting average, over .400, in the world series. Merkle is the first baseman of the Giants, known the world over as the player who failed to touch second base in his run and thereby lost the world's series for his team three years ago. Larry Doyle has been the efficient captain of the Giants for a couple of years, second in command of the organization and confidential adviser to Johnny McGraw.

HUERTA'S LAST COUP BAFFLING TO THE WASHINGTON OFFICIALS

DISMISSAL OF CONGRESS LEAVES HUERTA DICTATOR OF MEXICO AND THE PUZZLE IS TO GUESS HIS NEXT MOVE

Mexico City, Oct. 11.—Provisional President Huerta's coup last night, whereby he rid himself in a spectacular manner of the legislative bodies of the government and constituted himself dictator of the Mexican Republic, has left the city in a state of intense expectancy. The manner of its accomplishment serves to demonstrate the length to which the executive was prepared to go to mainstay his grasp on the administrative affairs of the nation.

Senator Dominguez, whose attack on the provisional president in the Senate was the starting point of the row, is said to have prepared for eventualities in advance.

Having determined on his line of conduct, he made his will and bade his family and friends good-bye.

DOMINION NO LONGER HAS BUTTER TO SPARE

Is Importing It From Other Countries—Making of Cheese Also Fallen Off.

Conditions affecting the marketing end of the dairy industry in Canada have undergone rapid changes during recent years. In the past it has been the custom to estimate the growth of the industry on the export trade. This, however, has become an entirely unreliable guide, because Canada no longer has butter to spare, but, on the other hand, finds it necessary to import from other countries. Cheese exports, too, have greatly decreased.

These facts were brought to the attention of the select standing committee on agriculture and colonization during the past session of parliament by Mr. J. A. Ruddick, dairy and cold storage commissioner, who showed very clearly that the industry is not losing ground but is making steady progress. It was brought out that the Canadian people are consuming relatively more milk and milk products than heretofore, and that an increasing quantity of milk is being manufactured into condensed milk, casein and other products.

During the course of Mr. Ruddick's evidence he gave out a great deal of interesting information concerning the tendency of the industry. This has now been printed in a pamphlet of fourteen pages, for free distribution to all who apply for it to the publications branch of the department of agriculture at Ottawa.
