LONDON NEWSPAPER COMMENT ON COMPLETION OF THE CANAL

CONGRATULATIONS EXTENDED TO UNITED STATES ON PRACTICAL COMPLETION OF GREAT WATERWAY AND WARM PRAISE FOR ENGINEERS.

London, Oct. 12.—The editorials in the London morning papers this morning heartily congratulate the United States on the practical completion of the Panama Canal.

The Daily Telegraph says the whole world has watched with admiration the skill and courage with which American engineers overcame countless and almost insuperable difficulties.

The Morning Post speaks of the gratitude that is due Ferdinand de Lesseps, the Frenchman who started the cutting of the canal in 1881, and says that the completion of the work is a new monument to his pioneer energy. The newspapers also print large articles explaining the engineering side of the canal and the probable results which will accrue to the world's shipping and commerce by reason of the opening of the new route between the Atlantic and the Pacific.

The Daily Mail, in an editorial, says it thinks the canal will prove a strong temptation to the United States to create something like a protectorate over Latin-America. "Those who know Latin-America best," the Daily Mail continues, "are convinced it has a splendid future, while it has both the determination and the power to work for itself. It would be a disaster to civilization should the United States allow itself to come into conflict with this right and resolution of Latin-America."

RAILWAY MAN GETS MERITED PROMOTION

J. H. Todd Has Been Appointed G. T. P. Superintendent, with Headquarters at Smithers.

According to a circular just issued, J. H. Todd has been promoted G. T. P. superintendent to fill the vacancy caused by the appointment of G. A. McNichol to the position of commissioner of the colonization and industrial department. Mr. Todd, who has been acting superintendent since Mr. McNichol left for the Yukon and Alaska on his special mission, has had years of experience in railway work and his promotion is a recognition of his ability. He will make his headquarters at Smithers in order that he may keep in close contact with operations on that portion of the division.

Mr. Todd is well known in Prince Rupert, where he acted for some time in the capacity of train dispatcher for the G. T. P. The appointment to the new position took effect from yesterday.

French Confidence in Canada.

Believing that Winnipeg was to float a thirteen million dollar loan this year to finance the Shoal Lake water supply scheme, French financiers have asked, through the Canadian commissioner in Paris, for the privilege of bidding for all or part of it. The loan will not be floated this year, states a Winnipeg despatch.

Yukon Navigation.

The Whitehorse Star of October 10th shows that steamers were still plying on the Yukon, but that navigation on the White River, the route from Dawson to the Chisana, had closed except for poing boats.

MAILS ALL WINTER

Dawson Will Not Wait Till May for Xmas Gifts.

The Dominion post office department has issued a special memorandum calling attention to the fact that in the future all classes of mail matter will be accepted for transmission to Yukon as freely in winter as in summer. Restrictions hitherto preventing winter service north of Whitehorse have been removed. Arrangements for this extension service were made by Dr. Thompson during the last session of parliament.

BETTER TERMS COMMISSION

Mr. Fred Cook of Ottawa to Be Appointed Secretary.

Ottawa, Oct. 13.—It is understood that within the next day or two an order in council will be passed and signed by the deputy governor general appointing Mr. Fred Cook as secretary of the British Columbia better terms commission. Mr. Cook, who is an ex-mayor of Ottawa, was for many years the correspondent of the London Times for Canada. He is still an active member of the parliamentary press gallery.

Regina, Sask., Oct. 12.—Two tons of food were destroyed by the health department during September. The figures were: Meat, 1,454 pounds; vegetables, 1,300 pounds; fruit, 1,275 pounds; candy, 20 pounds, and cream, 42 quarts.

TASSO MINING ACTIVITY

Aerial Tramway and Ore Bunkers Being Constructed.

A. McNaughton is back in Queen Charlotte from Tasso. He reports that everything is going along fine. The aerial tramway is being constructed as well as ore bunkers, there being twenty-five men at the work. The tramway will be about a mile long. It is expected that the mine will commence to ship ore about the first of the year.—Queen Charlotte News.
