TITLE TO FORTUNE HANGS ON INFANT

Living Baby Claimed to Have Been Substituted for Dead Child of English Heirs

The famous Slingsby baby substitution case is to be reopened in San Francisco. A. Carnegie Ross, British consul to San Francisco, has been appointed by the high court of chancery in England to take the testimony of witnesses, and upon the result will depend the disposition of the large Slingsby estate in Yorkshire, yielding an income of \$50,000 a year. Lieut. and Mrs. Charles Raymond Slingsby, who claim the infant as their own, are said to be on their way from Vancouver, B.C., to San Francisco to testify.

The Slingsby case came into international prominence more than a year ago when the lieutenant, who holds that rank in the British army, began a fight for the family fortune. He was opposed by his brother, who declared that the child was not the offspring of Mrs. Slingsby, but that of a California school girl, which was substituted for the dead baby of Slingsby's wife. Among the witnesses whose depositions will be taken are Mrs Hattie Bain, Mrs. Slingsby's nurse; Dr. W. W. Fraser, who issued the birth certificate in the case, and Dr. W. F. Snow, secretary of the state board of health, who investigated the circumstances of the alleged baby substitution.
