WILL CATER LARGELY TO LOCAL PATRONAGE

Canada Railway News Co. Will Serve Club Breakfast and Popular Priced Luncheons and Dinners.

As announced a few weeks ago, it is the intention of the Canada Railway News Co. to operate a lunch counter and dining room in connection with the temporary waiting rooms and offices of the G. T. P. in the building formerly operated as the Prince Rupert Inn. The room formerly used as the dining room of the hotel is now being fitted up to suit the purposes for which it is to be used. A partition has been put up through the centre of the room separating the dining room entirely from the lunch counter. The dining room will occupy the east half and the lunch counter the west half nearest the kitchen. From appearances so far the arrangement will be a most convenient one.

Manager McLean, of the Canada Railway News Co., states that it is his intention to cater to local trade. According to present plans he will serve in the dining room club breakfasts at popular prices, also a popular priced luncheon and dinner. Judging from the crowds of people who patronize the lunch counters in the city there is ample room for a restaurant run along these lines.

Mr. McLean hopes to be ready for opening in about two weeks.

WILL COMMENCE DEVELOPMENT.

According to Albert Lund, one of the owners in the well known Silver Leaf group in the Salmon river camp, work will shortly commence on that property. The recent purchase from Robert Cameron of the May P. J. claim, as the result of the visit of C. W. Frank, a Victoria mining engineer, has made it possible to consolidate all the interests. According to a report in the Vancouver Province of recent date, the vein is a slate and quartz breccia, and sampling across it for thirty inches gave returns of \$97.20 per ton. The vein occurs between granite-porphry and slates of the Naas formation. Values of the assay, referred to were made up of: Gold, \$15; silver, \$63; lead, \$19.20. The ore shoot is exposed in two cuts 104 feet apart.—Portland Canal Miner.
