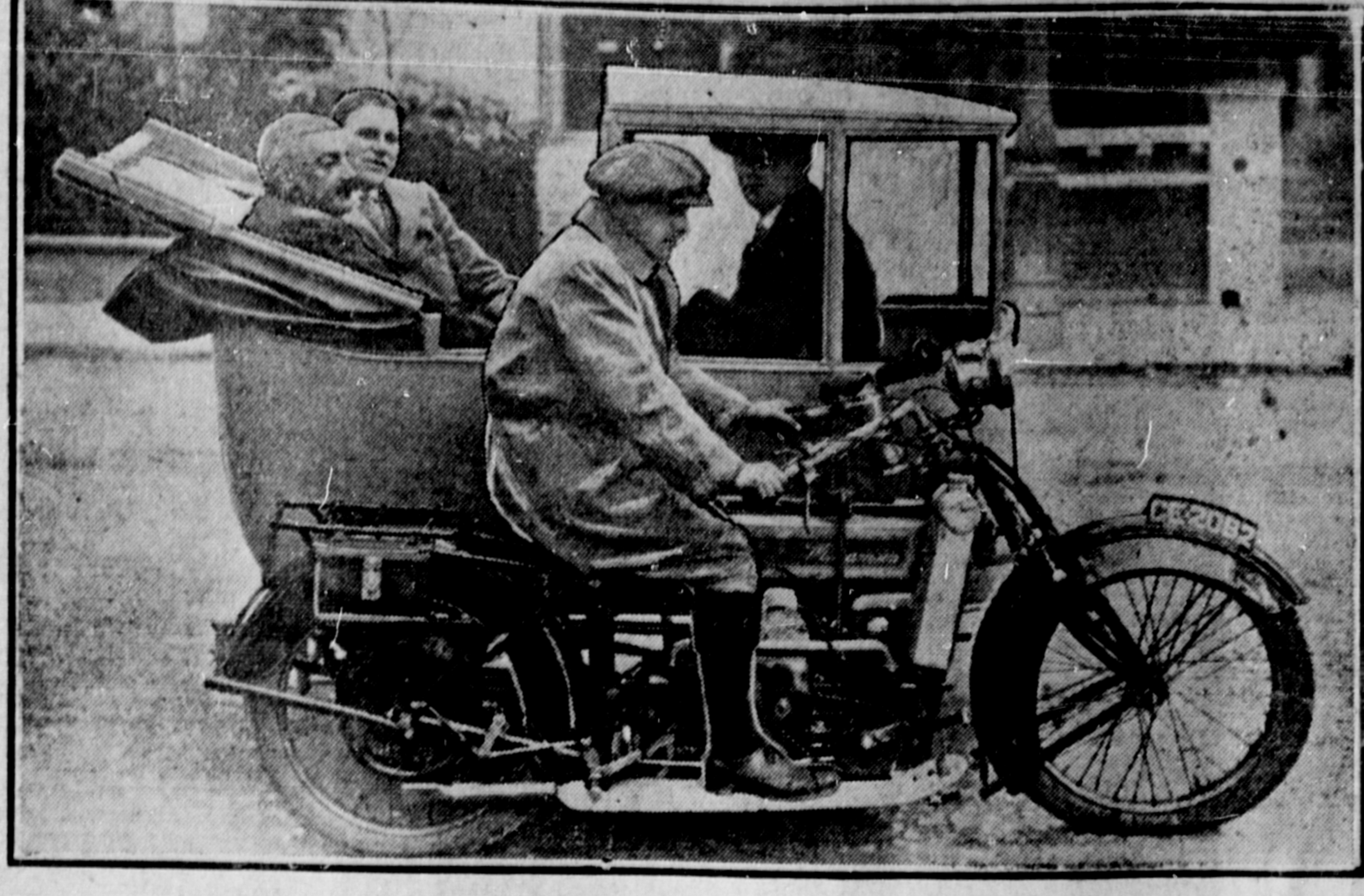

AMERICAN KILLS A MEXICAN IN A FIGHT AT LOS ANGELES

FIVE MEXICANS START GUN FIGHT ON AMERICAN POLICEMAN WHO RETURNS FIRE — TWENTY HELD FOR INVESTIGATION

Los Angeles, Nov. 4.—As an indirect result of what was said by the police to be bitter anti-American feeling among the thousands of Mexicans in Los Angeles, Adolfo Moreno, a Mexican was shot and killed here today by Albert C. Staples, a policeman, who had been shot at by Moreno and four companions. The officer was walking his beat in the Mexican quarter when he saw Moreno and four other men, all apparently intoxicated, crossing the street toward him. Suddenly one of the quintet fired his own revolver and shot Moreno through the body. Then he arrested J. Cortez, one of Moreno's companions, but the other two fled.

A squad of officers then went through the Mexican quarter and took fifty Mexicans to the city jail, where they were searched for weapons. Thirty were released and twenty held for further investigation. According to the police hundreds of Mexicans for many months have made it a weekly practice to congregate Sunday afternoons and nights at the Plaza, on the edge of Sonora town, as the Mexican district is called. These speeches have been made in Spanish, urging attacks upon the police, while pamphlets bearing incendiary promptings have been circulated freely, the officers say.

W. J. Elmendorf, general manager of the Portland Canal Tunnels, Ltd., accompanied by his wife, has been called to Seattle on account of the illness of Mrs. Elmendorf's mother.

James Lade, wife and children went south on the Prince George for Victoria, where they expect to spend the winter. Mr. Lade is interested in the L. L. & H. group, one of the best known properties up Bitter creek. During the past season he was in charge of the construction of a wagon road up the creek.

Miss M. A. Burpee, who since last May has had charge of the Stewart General Hospital, left on the Thursday boat for Seattle, as the hospital closed yesterday for the winter. On Tuesday evening at the Northern Hotel a large number of her friends made up a merry party at a dance given in her honor.

Sir William Mackenzie, president of the Canadian Northern Railway, is reported to have added to his many interests by acquiring control of the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co., owning what is stated to be the largest fishing fleet on the Northern Pacific and a large cold storage plant at Prince Rupert, B. C.

The Miner acknowledges the receipt of a bronze medal commemorating a record made by the force at the Mount Royal tunnel at Montreal of the Canadian Northern Railway for driving 810 feet of hard rock heading in 31 working days. The donor was C. C. LeBree, formerly accountant of the Canadian Northeastern Railway and now associated in a high capacity with the Mackenzie, Mann & Company forces at Montreal.—Portland Canal Miner.

FRATERNITIES BARRED. Girl Was Forced to Walk Streets in Tights.

Gloversville, N. Y., Nov. 3.—Because a handsome young woman of eighteen in the Gloversville high school was required to walk down street attired in tights and an unwilling smile as a part of a sorority initiation, the board of education has issued an order barring fraternities and societies from the school. The embarrassing ordeal to which the young woman was subjected became known to her parents, it is said, and they complained to the board. The ban on societies followed.

STEWART MINING OPERATIONS TO BE CONTINUED ALL WINTER

GLACIER CREEK'S BIG BORE NOW IN TWENTY-FOUR HUNDRED FEET—OPERATIONS AT INDIAN MINES AND LAKEVIEW PROPERTY

Up to yesterday the big bore being driven by the Portland Canal Tunnels, Ltd., had reached a distance of 2,400 feet and General Manager, W. J. Elmendorf, who left for the south on the Thursday boat, stated to The Miner that the face of the adit showed all signs of entering the Glacier Creek vein series as there had been a perceptible change in the rock being drilled into. It is more than possible that the tunnel will be in the vein proper in a very short period and interest locally is being maintained at a high pitch. Indian Mines—Manager Geo. Clothier states that the upper tunnel has reached a distance of 370 odd feet and the lower is in over 60 feet, according to the last reports brought down from

this promising Salmon river mine. Both adits are being driven on the ore, and in each distance the grade is excellent. Lakeview—This property has for several weeks past been undergoing surface development at the hands of the owner, James McKay, with most satisfactory results. The Prince George took south a test shipment of three tons for the Tacoma smelter and from a careful sample made by Assayer George E. Clothier, it is expected that the ore, which is a galena carrying high grade silver, will easily run over \$100 to the ton. The ore came from the surface, and it is more than likely as a result that work will be continued this winter.—Portland Canal Miner.

WONDERFUL SWIMMING BY A YOUNG FAT MAN

With Both Hands and Feet Tied He Tows Loaded Boat for Eight Miles

New York, Nov. 3.—Henry Eli-ionsky, of New London, Conn., who, though 19 years old, weighs 265 pounds, swam from Brooklyn Bridge to Bay Ridge, eight miles, yesterday afternoon with his hands and feet bound, and towed a rowboat in which were seven men weighing more than half a ton. He explains the fact that the feat took him three hours and eleven minutes by saying the tide in Buttermilk Channel was against him. The boat was attached to Eli-ionsky's shoulders by a sort of Dutch collar arrangement. The young swimmer was in fine physical condition at the end of his jaunt.

Jealousy Causes Two Deaths.

Pendleton, Ore., Nov. 3.—Dave Rowan, who was shot here by Charles Cook, who then killed himself, died last night at a hospital. Jealousy is given as the cause of the crime, Rowan being in the company of Cook's divorced wife and his little daughter at the time of the shooting.

KAISER BUYS PAPER Pays \$2,500,000 for Lokal Anzeiger for an Organ

Berlin, Nov. 4.—It is reported here that \$2,500,000 has been paid to retain a newspaper mouthpiece for the Kaiser's use. The money was paid to the August Scherl Newspaper Company, owners of the Berlin Lokal Anzeiger, in return for a pledge to keep the paper constantly at the government's disposal. This influential journal was in danger of falling into the hands of Rudolf Mosse, owner of the Berliner Tageblatt, which would leave the imperial party without an important newspaper.

NEW STYLES MANNISH Women's Fall Hats and Collars Masculine

Paris, Nov. 4.—Fall styles as displayed at the Auteuil races today have distinct masculine features. Hats are black velvet, modeled on the lines of a man's top hat, and distinguished by a single feather rising two inches above the crown. Silk collars of the Gladstone type, slightly stiffened and held in position by a gold pin, were seen, worn with tailored suits. There were also self-colored ties worn with stand-up winged collars.
