## TO BRING CANADA BEFORE THE NOTICE OF THE WHOLE WORLD

MOVEMENT TO HOLD AN INTER-IMPERIAL EXPOSITION IN NINETEEN-SEVENTEEN FINDS VERY GENERAL SUPPORT IN GREAT BRITAIN.

London, Nov. 7.—The movement to celebrate Canada's jubilee by an international inter-imperial exhibition in 1917 is being warmly supported in official, financial and business circles here. Expressions of approval have been received from Lord Strathcona, Lord Desborough, Earl Grey, Sir Thomas Skinner, Mr. A. W. Smithers, chairman of the Grand Trunk; Mr. Burbidge, manager of Harrod's Stores; Sir Trevor Dawson of Vickers and also from 3,000 leading manufacturers of London, Liverpool, Manchester, Birmingham, Sheffield, Leeds, Bradford, Halifax, Hull, Bristol, Glasgow, Aberdeen, Dundee and Belfast. Many of those manufacturers state that they are considering the establishment of Canadian branches.

There is every prospect that Australia will make a representative display, the Commonwealth desiring to promote the closest possible relations with Canada.

Mr. Leonard Palmer, who recently returned from a consultation with the governments and other authorities in Canada, and is now organizing the project, says that it of course rests with Canada to decide the exact form the exhibition will take and whether it will be held in Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto, Winnipeg, Vancouver or Prince Rupert.

## HAZELTON MINING NEWS.

D. J. Williams, formerly assistant superintendent of the Pittsmead mine and smelter at Butte, will be manager, with F. W. Cochrane as electrical engineer and Frank A. Brown mine superintendent.

An important feature in connection with mining on Rocher de Boule Mountain is that the various properties desiring it can have telephone connection with New Hazelton and the Dominion telegraph service. Telephone service will be given the Cross-Island and the Continental Development Co. will extend the line to Rocher de Boule mine.

The first work to be undertaken is the development of a waterpower on Juniper Creek, about five miles down the hill from the camp. Here a dam and headgate will be constructed and a pipe line 3,500 feet long will be laid. The pipe line will deliver the water to an improved Pelton wheel under a 200 foot head and will generate about 200 electrical horsepower.

The power will be transmitted to the mine, where a ten drill compressor will be installed near the site of the new main working tunnel. This tunnel will be started the moment power is available and driven with three shifts of miners to tap the upper, or No. 1, ledge at an added depth of 500 feet. Until this work is accomplished it is not the present intention to do any other mining or development work.

The Continental Development Co., of Butte, Mont., which holds the two year lease on the upper workings of Rocher de Boule mine recently granted to J. E. Oppenheimer and associates, has started to equip that property with a full complement of machinery. A force of twenty men will be employed at the start and the force will be maintained at

that number until the property goes on a producing basis.

So far as the Provincial government is concerned work was stopped on the Silver Standard road last Tuesday. It was only half done, but it was not permitted to remain half finished very long, as it is useless in that condition. The owners of the Silver Standard mine have decided to complete the job and last Monday made arrangements with the government agent, S. H. Hoskins, and Road Superintendent William Carr to leave the government outfit, and camp, increase the force of men and rush the work to completion. This will provide a good winter road and permit of ore shipments.

## WIRELESS TO CANADA

Marconi Company to Cut Price to Fivepence a Word.

London, Nov. 7.—A wireless line devoted entirely to traffic between Canada and the United Kingdom is among the many important wireless developments now pending with the Marconi Company, and it is hoped to complete arrangements very shortly by which the present lines from Glace Bay to Clifden will be entirely devoted to Canada.

"We have just completed the installation of a duplex system at those two stations," says an official of the company. "We expect that in a week or two everything will be ready. We hope to transmit messages at the rate of 100 words per minute, and receive that at a similar rate, and propose to lower the tariff between Great Britain and Canada to fivepence per word as against seven and a half pence per word at the present time, and one shilling per word as charged by the cable companies."
