VOTES FOR WOMEN PROMISED  
IF MILITANTS WILL BE GOODMEASURE FOR ENFRANCHISEMENT OF WOMEN MAY BE  
MADE SPECIAL PLANK IN OFFICIAL PROGRAMME OF  
LIBERAL PARTY

London, Nov. 10.—Decided efforts are being made to induce the British Government to come to an agreement with the suffragists, whereby a measure for the enfranchisement of women can be made a part of the official programme of the Liberal party.

Some suffragist leaders said today that this movement has obtained considerable headway. A strong feature of the conferences has been the presence of Mr. and Mrs. Frederick William Pethick Lawrence, who left the Women's Social and Political Union at the request of Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst.

It is known that the government will consider a compromise based only on unqualified repudiation of the Women's Social and Political Union and all its militant methods.

Hitherto the constitutional suffragists have refused to criticize their militant sisters formally, declaring that it was bad tactics in the face of the common enemy to question the actions of the militants, but several constitutional suffragette leaders now express themselves willing to abandon this attitude. They have, they say, become convinced that only by suppression of the militants is there any hope of obtaining the parliamentary suffrage for women. Women already possess the municipal suffrage and may hold any civic office outside of parliament.

REWARDS PAID IN DAWSON FOR  
ARREST OF DREDGE DYNAMITERFIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS DISTRIBUTED BY YUKON GOLD  
COMPANY AMONG IMPORTANT WITNESSES WHO  
ASSISTED IN SECURING CONVICTION

Dawson, Y.T., Nov. 4.—The reward of five thousand dollars in cash which was offered by the Yukon Gold Company for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the man who dynamited the company's dredge No. 4 on lower Bonanza last February, has been distributed. The money is divided among those who brought about the arrest and conviction of Jacob Neilson, who was sentenced by Judge McCaulay to twenty years in jail, and who is now serving the time in the Kingston penitentiary.

The money was distributed in two lots. Eighty per cent. was allowed to those bringing in the first information or evidence on certain points, and twenty per cent. to those who later brought corroborative evidence. Thirty-one men and one woman share in the money. The one woman is Miss E. Kolhaus, an expert on typewriting, connected with the Bennett factory, in Pennsylvania. The men include a number of the Yukon Gold staff at Dawson, among them C. A. Thomas, resident manager; and several members of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police; various witnesses who testified as to the movements of Neilson, others who testified regarding the typewriter he used, others who gave expert testimony regarding paper, printing

and the like. Each witness was allowed a sum in proportion to the importance of the evidence submitted. The jury in the case made the awards. The jurors were George Gale, George Hornshaw, William O'Brien, George D. Johnson, Frank Hale and C. D. Hart.

## Nelson to Get Gas Plant

Nelson, Nov. 10.—By the largest majority ever given to a money-by-law in Nelson the property owners voted to purchase for \$50,000 the Nelson Coke and Gas Company's plant. Nelson now owns the municipal power plant, waterworks, gas, street making plant and is negotiating for the street railway system. The vote for the by-law was 401 to 89 against.

## East Middlesex By-Election

London, Ont., Nov. 10.—The Conservatives of East Middlesex on Saturday nominated Mr. John McFarland of Nissouri as candidate for the legislature, to fill the vacancy created by the death of George W. Neeley. The Liberals will nominate on the 15th and the election will take place on the 27th.

NEW YORK'S FUSION  
CHOICE FOR MAYORYoungest Man Ever Elected as  
Mayor of Greater New York  
and Youngest Leading  
Official

John Purroy Mitchel, elected mayor of New York City, is 34 years old, and comes from Irish stock. Mitchell's career has been short but swift. After graduating at St. John's college in Fordham and the Columbia law school, he entered the office of the corporation counsel as an assistant. There he began, at the age of 27, the political investigation of Tammany leaders which resulted in the removal from office of a number of borough presidents.

Mitchell was made commissioner of accounts by Mayor McClelland, and went through department after department of the municipal government in his investigations. When Gaynor was elected mayor four years ago, on the regular Democratic ticket, all the Fusion candidates for the other offices were elected at the same time. Mitchell was one of them. He became president of the Board of Aldermen, and, by virtue of his office, a member of the board of estimate, which is the real governing body of New York City. When Gaynor was shot in August, 1910, Mitchell became acting mayor.

He was chosen collector of the port of New York soon after President Wilson assumed office. He was the youngest man ever appointed commissioner of accounts, the youngest man ever elected president of the board of aldermen, the youngest man ever appointed collector of the port of New York and the youngest man ever elected mayor of Greater New York.
