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LARKIN THREATENS TO START GENERAL LABOR WAR

MEXICAN REBELS REFUSE TO TREAT WITH UNITED STATES---SEVEN STOREY BUILDING FALLS

REBELS INDIGNANTLY DECLINE TO TREAT WITH UNITED STATES

GENERAL CARRANZA SAYS THEY WILL ACCEPT NO INTERFERENCE BY ANY NATION—WILSON NOW PLACED IN A DILEMMA

Nogales, Nov. 15.—"We accept no transaction with nor interference of any nation to regulate Mexico's internal affairs." This declaration is the most explicit and definite the revolutionary leader has yet uttered. It was made by General Carranza yesterday, after a second conference with President Wilson's special envoy, William Hale.

Washington, Nov. 15.—Envoy William Hale has reported by cable the result of his conference with General Carranza yesterday, in which the latter declined to consider any overtures from the United States. The Huerta officials are urging for time for further parleys but the government here has refused to resume negotiations with them until assurances are given that Huerta will resign.

Mexico City, Nov. 15.—The proprietors of the business houses here are ordering their employees to leave the capital at once and to proceed to Vera Cruz so as to be able to quit the country as soon as the international fighting begins.

LARKIN TO HAVE LABOR WAR ALL OVER THE BRITISH ISLES

UNIONISTS MAKING PARTY CAPITAL OUT OF GOVERNMENT'S CROWNING BLUNDER—JOHN REDMOND AND WIFE ATTACKED BY MILITANTS

London, Nov. 15.—To James Larkin his release is the greatest triumph of his career, and it is the worst blow the Earl of Aberdeen has received since he has been Viceroy. Larkin promises a labor war throughout the United Kingdom. The fight, he states, is only just starting. Thousands of strikers armed with clubs parade the streets of Dublin. The Unionists are making party capital out of the government's crowning folly.

Newcastle-on-Tyne, Eng., Nov. 15.—John Redmond, the Irish leader, and his wife were attacked by suffragettes yesterday while on board the train at Durham. The militants entered the compartment where the couple were seated and, after declaring the Irish leader had not done enough for the women of Ireland, struck him on the head and Mrs. Redmond on the back. They then scattered the contents of a bag of flour over both. The rowdy women were ejected from the train and handed over to the police.

London, Nov. 15.—Last evening, before the Dominion Royal Commission, Second Secretary of the Post Office Edward Crabb submitted a statement on behalf of the postal department declaring plainly that a state-owned Atlantic cable was not necessary and would not pay. These views, he said, were put forward on a purely commercial aspect.

GOVERNMENT IS ASKED TO AID SEARCH FOR THE DROWNED

NO FURTHER REPORTS OF LOSS OF LIFE RESULTING FROM TERRIFIC STORM ON THE GREAT LAKES

Ottawa, Nov. 15.—Several messages were received by the Department of Marine and Fisheries yesterday from Goderich, Collingwood and other points, asking the government to render every aid possible in connection with the search for bodies of those lost in the rivers in the great storm on Lakes Huron and Superior.

Port Huron, Nov. 15.—No further reports have been received of loss of life in the great storm which swept the lakes early this week. One more boat reported wrecked, is that of the Major. The loss of life among sailors due to the storm is now estimated at approximately two hundred and fifty-six, and the property loss at five millions. The latter includes a score or more of vessels driven on the rocks or shore and partially or totally destroyed. One hundred and ninety-five lives were lost in Lake Huron alone, forty-eight on Lake Superior, seven on Lake Michigan, and six on Lake Erie.

Sault Ste. Marie, Nov. 15.—The steamer Barnum, upbound, picked up the derelict steamer Major, which was abandoned by her crew during the storm. She now lies beyond White Fish Bay.

CANADIAN UNIONIST LEAGUE FORMED TO HELP IN IRELAND

LEAGUE LEADERS SAY ORGANIZATION DOES NOT FAVOR HOME RULE—HEADQUARTERS IN TORONTO—WESTERN PROVINCES TO BE ORGANIZED.

Toronto, Nov. 12.—Official confirmation of the formation of a Unionist party in Toronto has been received in the form of the following communication to the secretary, J. A. Jackson: "There has been formed in Canada a 'Canadian Unionist League,' the executive council of which is in the city of Toronto. The object of the league is to enlist all Canadians who are willing to assist the Unionists of Ireland in maintaining the position they at present occupy in the Empire, and to the utmost of our power we propose to assist the Unionist party of Ireland under the present trying circumstances in which they are placed.

"Four branches have been formed in the country and at the present time we have enrolled 1,000. We have also received information from outlying districts throughout Ontario that leagues will come into existence at once. Already Manitoba is organized and British Columbia, Saskatchewan and Alberta will be organized without delay.

"Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Newfoundland will also be organized in order to demonstrate to the British people that Canada is misrepresented when any person claims that she is in favor of granting home rule to Ireland."

KIMSQUIT INDIAN IS NOW FOUND GUILTY

His Second Trial for Bella Coola Shooting Results in Verdict of Manslaughter

Vancouver, Nov. 15.—Following the disagreement of the jury in the Indian murder trial, a conference of crown counsel was held at which it was decided to place George Wilson on trial again yesterday on the same charge in the effort to secure a disposition of the case. Wilson was accordingly arraigned again on a charge of shooting and killing Charles Wilson, George Paul and Emma Wilson. The evidence against Wilson was identical the same as that given at the first trial, and the new jury found the prisoner guilty of manslaughter, sentence being deferred.

MORE WORK TO START ON GOVT. BUILDINGS

Architect Cox Announces that the Building of Retaining Walls Will Start Monday

A. A. Cox, the architect for the permanent provincial buildings for Prince Rupert, who arrived in the city this morning, announces that the work of building the retaining walls for the lanes running from 1st to 3rd Avenues towards Government Place will start on Monday. Both lanes will be continued as tunnels under Government Place to the basement of the government buildings. The retaining walls have to be built before the work on the tunnels can proceed.

Mr. Cox reports that everything is in good shape as far as the plans are concerned. They are now in the hands of the Premier who will likely pass on them very shortly. E. G. Baxter, provincial government engineer with headquarters here, will superintend construction.

NO SPECIAL PRIVILEGES

Detective Douglas Discovers a Rebate on Taxes Paid Since November 1

To the Editor of The News:
Sir, — Yesterday ex-Alderman Douglas in a letter to the editor's newspaper intimated that I had received special privileges from Acting Mayor Naden in the way of a rebate of \$3.87 on my taxes after the closing date for rebates. I want to state that I have neither asked for nor received any favors from any city official or member of the city council. Had ex-Ald. Douglas taken the manly way of seeking his information from the city officials instead of getting it over the shoulder of a ratepayer transacting business at the city hall counter, he would probably have gotten the correct facts and figures.

In explanation of the transaction I might say that being out of the city and not having received my tax notice I wrote the agent of my property asking him to pay my taxes in time to secure the rebate. He went to the city hall and was given a copy of my tax slip and he issued a check for the amount shown. On my arrival here I discovered that three lots had not been entered on the copy of my tax notice. Consequently those taxes were not paid, although my agent had appeared in good faith prepared to pay all taxes due.

As I was not responsible for the error (which is an excusable one at a time when so much detail work is being done in the collector's department), I naturally asked for the rebate. The department admitted the justice of my claim and after consulting with the acting mayor and city
