Hon. W. R. Ross, minister of lands, has had a new map of the mining divisions published. This is the best map yet issued by the provincial government in connection with mining information. The boundaries of the divisions, location of recording offices, roads and trails are clearly shown. The map is on a scale of thirty miles to the inch and will prove valuable to prospectors and explorers.

BORDEN'S FIASCO AS COMPARED WITH SUCCESS OF AUSTRALIA

BRITISH NAVAL AUTHORITIES DECLARE THAT PROVISION OF LOCAL FLEET UNITS IS BETTER THAN NAVAL CONTRIBUTIONS.

London, Nov. 16.—There are increasing signs here that responsible leaders of naval affairs and public opinion are recognizing the Canadian Liberal naval policy as the only possible permanent one. New Zealand's abandonment of contributions in favor of a local navy has been followed by admissions from leading Imperialists that this was an inevitable growth. Jebb's statement, which I cabled Tuesday, has been followed by other declarations along the same line.

Thus Admiral W. H. Henderson writes: "Until imperial federation is secured, which to effect will, I think, take much longer than ten years, the only form of naval policy under existing conditions which the motherland and her daughter nations can adopt must be on the lines undertaken by the Commonwealth. All others can only lead to friction and disappointment. They are self-governing states numbering fifteen million people, and only their own parliaments have power to tax them and control their expenditure. When this is done the interest, pride and patriotism of the people are aroused and the production of an efficient personnel is encouraged, none of which is attained by contributions. The donations question is one of no taxation without representation, ignoring which we lost the American colonies."

Admiral Freemantle also supports Jebb: "I am glad to support Jebb's view, that it is important that the relations between the Dominions and our

miralty should not be hung up until the federation of the Empire for defence becomes possible. The admiralty at the request of the Commonwealth sent our admiral, Sir Reginald Henderson, to confer with the Australian government and his proposals, though thorough and entailing heavy expenditure, were accepted by all parties and were carried out by a labor government loyalty, so that the Australian unit is now in a fair way to completion, while suitable defences and training establishments are being established. Surely this is an object lesson in the right course to adopt, and the enthusiasm in naval defence in the Commonwealth is in strong contrast to the unfortunate political difficulties in which Mr. Borden has been involved in his endeavors to get admiralty views adopted."

W. S. Feilding, expressing his satisfaction, said, "Happily, light is dawning and as the letters referred to show, there are many Britons in the United Kingdom who realize that the policy of contributions is not as wise as it was supposed. But let us hope that the admiralty and the Canadian government will be able to reconsider their action, and by returning to the policy of 1909 bring Australia, New Zealand and Canada into happy co-operation along lines which will create as quickly as possible a colonial defence."

BULGARIA HAS SENT GREECE ULTIMATUM

Note is Couched in Strong Terms Giving Eight Days for Acceptance

Sofia, Nov. 13.—Bulgaria has sent through the French legation an ultimatum to Greece demanding:

That persecution of Bulgarians in Macedonia cease.

That autonomous rights be accorded to Bulgarian churches and schools in Macedonia, such as they enjoyed under Turkish rule.

Permission for Macedonia Bulgarians, who fled from the reign of terror, to return unmolested to their homes.

That all Bulgarian prisoners in Greece be released, and that all prisoners of war be allowed to return to Bulgaria.

The ultimatum is couched in strong language and places a limit of eight days for its acceptance.
