Vancouver, Nov. 15.—Charles Dean, recently acquitted at the New Westminster assizes on a charge of being implicated in the great robbery from the Bank of Montreal in that city, is being diligently sought for by private detectives in Seattle, to which place he is believed to have gone following his liberation from the penitentiary. On his discovery may rest the life of one of the two young men now occupying cells in the "death corridor" of the provincial jail at New Westminster, having been convicted of the murder of Police Constable James Archibald in Vancouver on May 28th of this year.
