SKELETON OF MASTODON DUG UP IN SEATTLE CITY LIMITS

UNIVERSITY PROFESSOR SAYS THAT IT HAS LAIN UNDISTURBED FOR FAR MORE THAN A MILLION YEARS—AWFUL SACRILEGE.

Seattle, Nov. 18.—While excavating for the new stadium at West Seattle, and when about 150 feet below the surface, the engineers unearthed the skeleton of a mastodon, which, according to Professor J. H. Bretz, of the University of Washington, has lain undisturbed for more than a million years.

The big stream of water forced into the blue clay in which the skeleton was imbedded tore the bones apart, and many of them were disintegrated. But enough were preserved to make it clear that they once belonged to one of the monster hairy elephants which roamed this region before the hills of Seattle were lifted out of the ooze and slime of the land then making.
