HOW THE MONEY GOES UNDER BORDEN RULE.

Growing articles recently appeared in a number of Tory newspapers announcing that the government had let a number of contracts. Naturally the majority of these were for drill halls, to be added to the collection of over fifty that Colonel the Hon. Sam Hughes has already got through. The order in which these contracts went, with the populations of the places which got the works, makes interesting reading as an exemplification of the manner in which Mr. Borden is not carrying out his promises of economy. These are the places favored with the last bunch of public works:

Beauport, Que., contract let for a \$30,000 drill hall. According to the census of 1911, Beauport's population was 3,546, of which 1,775 were males. In 1901 Beauport's population was 6,800.

Kemptville, Ont., contract let for drill hall to cost \$11,800. According to the census of 1911, Kemptville had a population of 1,492, as against 1,623 in 1901.

Greenwood, B. C., contract let for public building to cost \$41,000. Greenwood's population, according to the census of 1911, was 778, as against 1,359 in 1901.

Prince Rupert is to have a drill hall, but this is a real necessity as a part of the protection of this great port when Canada has a navy of her own

and because it is a growing seaport of immense possibilities instead of a small interior town which has never been of marked importance and is gradually losing all it ever had. With huge expenditures of the kind mentioned above for very small places—and these are merely typical of similar public works expenditures of the present year—it is small wonder that Canada has the highest tax rate of any country in the world, without spending the vast sums on defence and offence that the old countries of Europe have to provide for.

BORDEN AND HIS TARIFF DILEMMA.

For some time after the new American tariff went into effect Conservative papers tried to meet the demand for free wheat and flour so as to secure free entrance for these products into U. S. markets by declaring they can get in free anyway under the provisions of the Underwood law. A few days ago Secretary Hamlin, of the U. S. treasury, made the following ruling: "Wheat and wheat flour will not be admitted free to the U. S. from those countries which decline to admit free of duty similar products from the U. S." And the trouble is that the interests which control the Borden government are afraid that once the Canadian people are given a taste of free foodstuffs they will redouble their support of the Liberal demand of general tariff reduction.

NEARLY EIGHT MILLIONS OF RESERVE ORE NEAR SMELTER

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GRANBY CONSOLIDATED MINING, SMELTING AND POWER COMPANY—EXPENDITURE ON HIDDEN CREEK MINE

At the annual meeting of the Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting and Power Company, Limited, held at New York on October 7, the report for the fiscal year to June 30 showed an operating profit of \$1,214,599 on the 150,000 shares outstanding, as compared with \$583,379 for the previous year, when the plant was idle for six months owing to the labor troubles in the Crow's Nest Pass coal fields. The president, W. H. Nichols, stated the cost of production had been the lowest in the company's history, although the recoveries were also materially reduced, being 17.68 lbs. copper per ton of ore. The ore reserves at Grand Forks had not been fully maintained, being now reduced to 5,613,000 tons. At Anyox the ore reserves were estimated at 7,759,000 tons, carrying 2.2% copper, and the 2,000 ton smelter there will commence operations early in the new year. The expenditure on

the Hidden Creek mine for the fiscal year was \$1,058,724, making the total expenditure on the property to the end of the fiscal year \$2,038,035. Of this amount \$979,461 expended in 1912 was provided from the surplus profits of the company, and the balance from the issue of bonds floated this year.

The surplus of cash and quick assets in the treasury at the close of the fiscal year was \$2,587,924. J. P. Graves resigned as general manager, though he retains his position as vice president. F. M. Sylvester, hitherto assistant general manager, was appointed to the board of directors and to succeed J. P. Graves as general manager.—Portland Canal Miner.

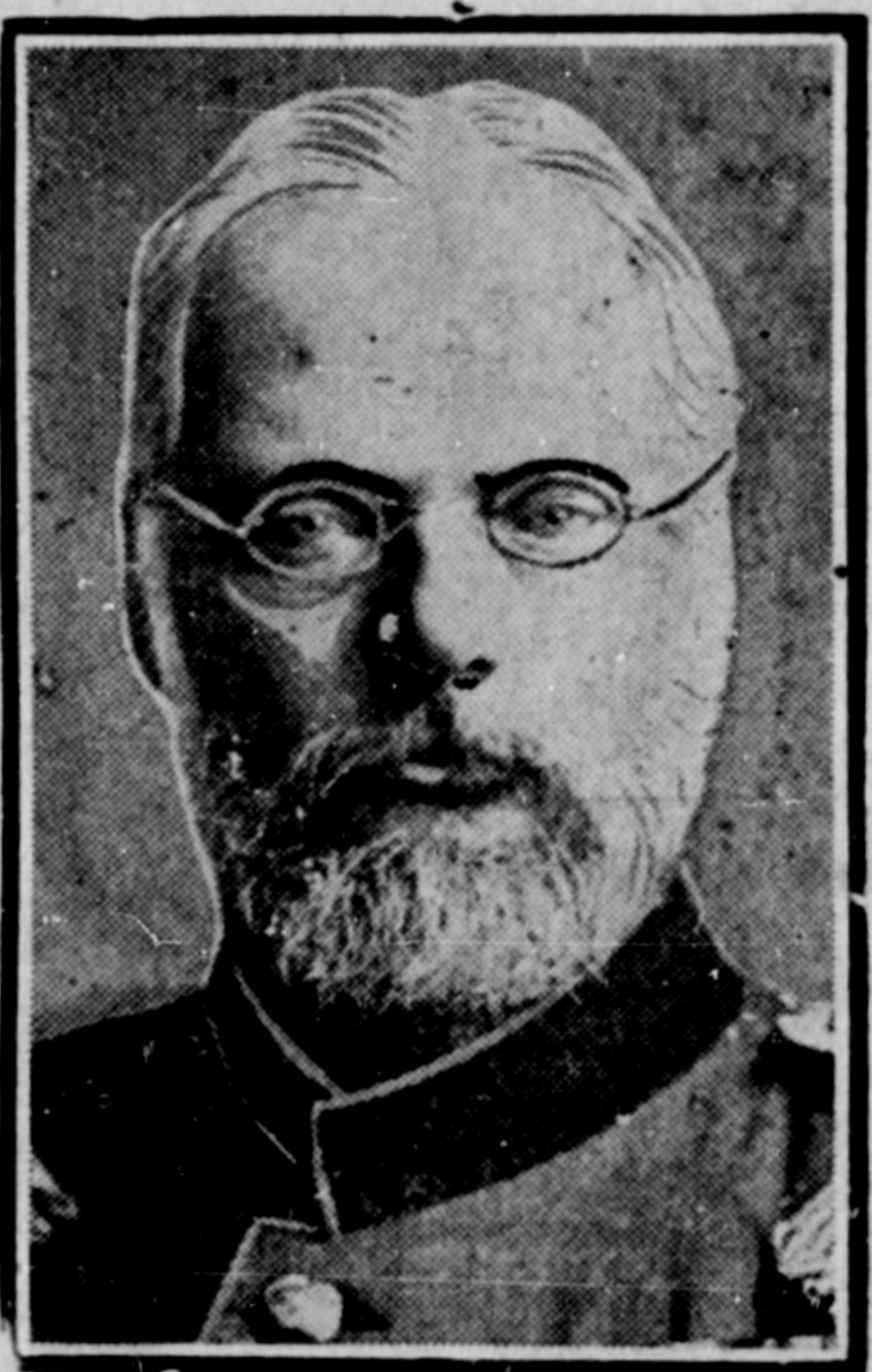
