ding a hope that something might soon be done in the way of teaching the children practical gardening in school gardens.

Wm. Manson, M.P.P., said he had long felt the need of such an official as Mr. Tomlinson and when Messrs. Scott and Carpenter had visited the district the matter had been gone into thoroughly and it was decided to have a man on the ground. No definite policy had been laid down, but a free hand had been given Mr. Tomlinson. He thought the Hospital would be pleased to hand over their grounds to Mr. Tomlinson to beautify in any way he thought proper.

M. M. Stephens said the city would benefit as well as the people in this movement. Speaking from his own experience, he was sure that advice from Mr. Tomlinson would save gardening enthusiasts much time and money. Although the soil was sour yet it was strong; it had been proved that the finest flowers could be grown.

The Acting Mayor, Mr. Geo. R. Naden emphasized the natural beauties of the city and expressed his sympathy with the movement although he did not pretend to be a gardener.

Mr. J. H. McMullin also heartily commended the movement.

Mr. P. F. Godenrath, on behalf of the Board of Trade, extended an invitation to use the newly-established exhibition rooms.

After Father Bunoz, the Rev. J. F. Dimmick, and the Rev. W. E. Colison had spoken in support of the scheme, Mr. D. G. Stewart proposed the formation of a Society. This was carried unanimously, and officers were then elected as above, the membership fee being fixed at \$1.00 per year. It was then decided to hold another meeting during the third week in January, and the committee were asked to prepare a report and plans for the future.

H. F. McRae said he would like to see a prize scheme established which would give a chance to the man who owned a cheap lot and had to do all his own work, whereas others, more fortunately placed, could afford to hire help.
