GENERAL NEWS NOTES

The heavy loss of life and property sustained as a result of the recent tempest on the Great Lakes and which inevitably will hit the insurance companies affected hard, revives the question of the establishment of a Canadian Lloyds.

The ex-hangman, James Berry, who had executed more than 500 men, died the other day at Bradford, York. After retiring from the post of public executioner, Berry became a revivalist and led religious demonstrations in various parts of the country.

It is very evident that the British war office intends strengthening the position of its representatives in India, for instead of appointing an officer of the British army to the important position of commander-in-chief in succession to Sir O'Moore Creagh, Sir Beauchamp Duff has been selected from the Indian army.

Aged one hundred and eight years, Thomas Grant has just died at Killeavy, County Armagh. Three weeks ago Grant was working in the fields assisting to stack the corn.

An expenditure of \$2,500,000 for good roads in the Province of Manitoba was announced by Sir Rodmond Roblin at Minnedosa last week.

During the hunting season, which ended Sunday, there were 135 lives lost in twenty-one states of the United States.

More than one-third of Australia's residents live in four cities—Sydney, Adelaide, Melbourne and Brisbane.

The Hamburg-American Line has decided to reduce the steerage fare to New York to \$29.50 and the fare to Boston and Philadelphia to \$27. The other members of the Atlantic steamship pool are expected to adopt the same rates.

A congressman has introduced a bill to prevent shipment of any goods which have been in cold storage over ninety days. This would suit the dealers in canned goods.

In the federal prison at Atlanta, Georgia, prisoners are no longer identified by numbers, but their names are used. A further step forward is taken and the prisoners are permitted to use aliases to conceal the names which they bore before imprisonment.

Sammy Good vs. Lem Kegg of San Francisco, the main boxing event on the card at the Eagles' smoker, Tacoma, went four hard, fast rounds to a draw. Kegg is from Prince Rupert.

The Kaiser has taken drastic measures to suppress the tango craze, which has obtained a firm grip on society. Orders have been issued by the court chamberlain that the tango must not be danced either at court balls or at any diplomatic functions where princes or other royalties may be present.

The Australian defence forces show a grand total of 240,065, of which 281 officers and 7,507 men are connected with the navy, while 4,885 officers and 227,422 troops are attached to the army. The last number includes 50,000 riflemen and 146,000 cadets.

If Ortie E. McManigal comes to Canada, as is reported in press despatches to be his intention, he will be turned back by the immigration authorities as an undesirable, according to a statement by the superintendent of that department.

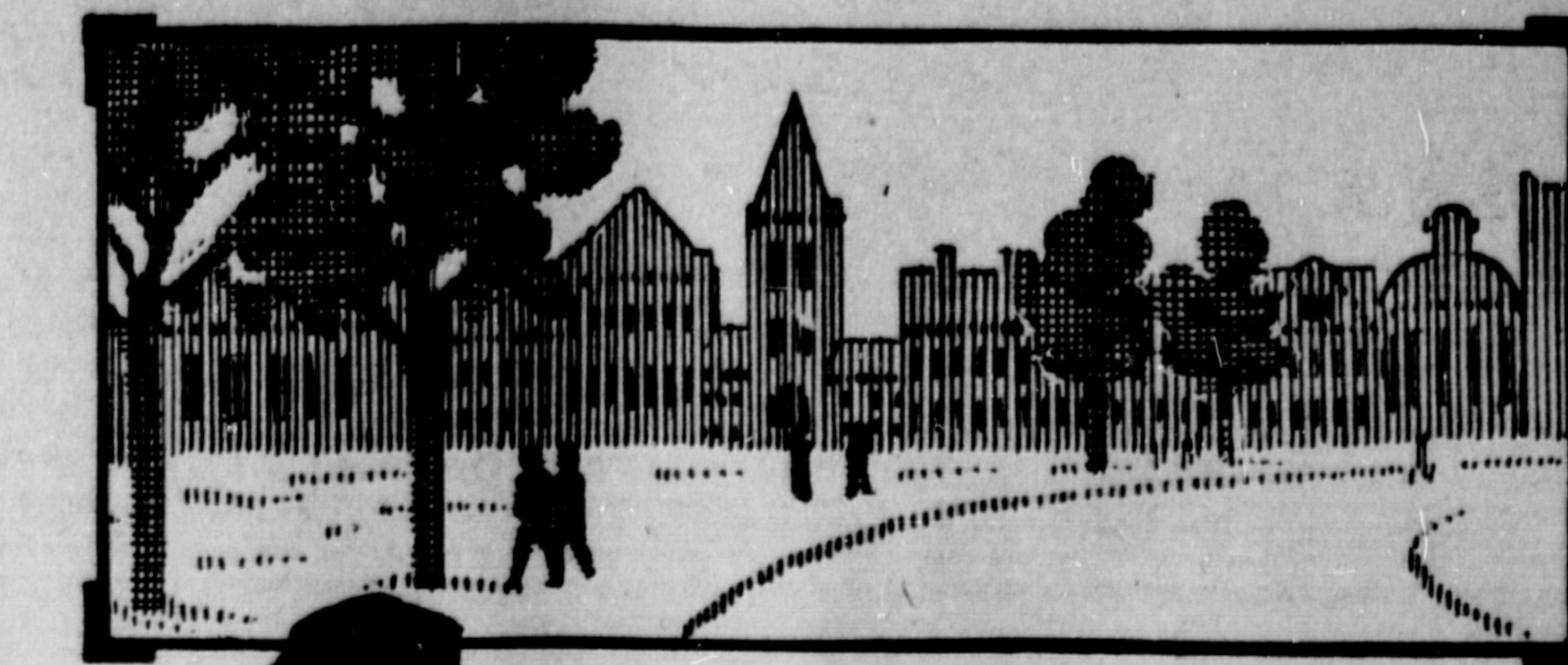
