MAYOR REFUSES INVESTIGATION OF NATIONALITY

Rules Motion in Police Commissioners Meeting Out of Order

"I rule that motion out of order," said Mayor Patullo at the tail end of the Police Commissioners' meeting yesterday afternoon.

"I think it is a great mistake. Here we are spending hundreds of thousands of dollars to bring foreigners to our city and this country and it is a great mistake to be investigating the nationality of the holder of every petty little office and job. It makes me indignant."

This speech was made with some evidence of feeling.

It was in response to a motion offered by Commissioner Tom Maitland and Commissioner McColl, asking for the Chief of Police to bring in a report showing whether or not the holders of barkeepers' licenses were British subjects.

These licences are under the jurisdiction of the licence board. The subject was broached by Commissioner McColl, who asked the question. No one knew the answer, which prompted Commissioner Tom to say:

"Do you want a report on it?"

"Yes," from Com. McColl.

"Well, I'll move that!"

But the mayor broke in on him and declared the motion out of order.

The only business of the session was to pass the Chief's report and the monthly accounts.

COST OF POWER

Under Proposed Agreement Between City and Hydro-Electric Co.

The net cost to the city of the power under the proposed agreement would be as follows:

For 500 horse power or less, \$53.52 per horse power a year.

For 500 horse power to 1,000 horse power, \$41.85 per horse power a year.

For 1,000 horse power to 1,500 horse power, \$38.71 per horse power a year.

For 1,500 horse power to 2,000 horse power, \$32.16 per horse power a year.

For 2,000 horse power to 2,500 horse power, \$31.68 per horse power a year.

For 2,500 horse power, \$28.75 per horse power a year.

These prices include fixed charges on transforming and distributing and loss of power in stepping it down.

First Habeas Corpus

The first habeas corpus case to come up in Rupert is being heard today before Judge Young. It is an application to show cause why Wm. Shannon, sentenced to six months for selling liquor, should not be discharged. Shannon committed the offence at Decker Lake which is in Cariboo County. The trial was in Atlin County and while the magistrate has jurisdiction in both counties, the point is whether he had a right to try a Cariboo case in Atlin.

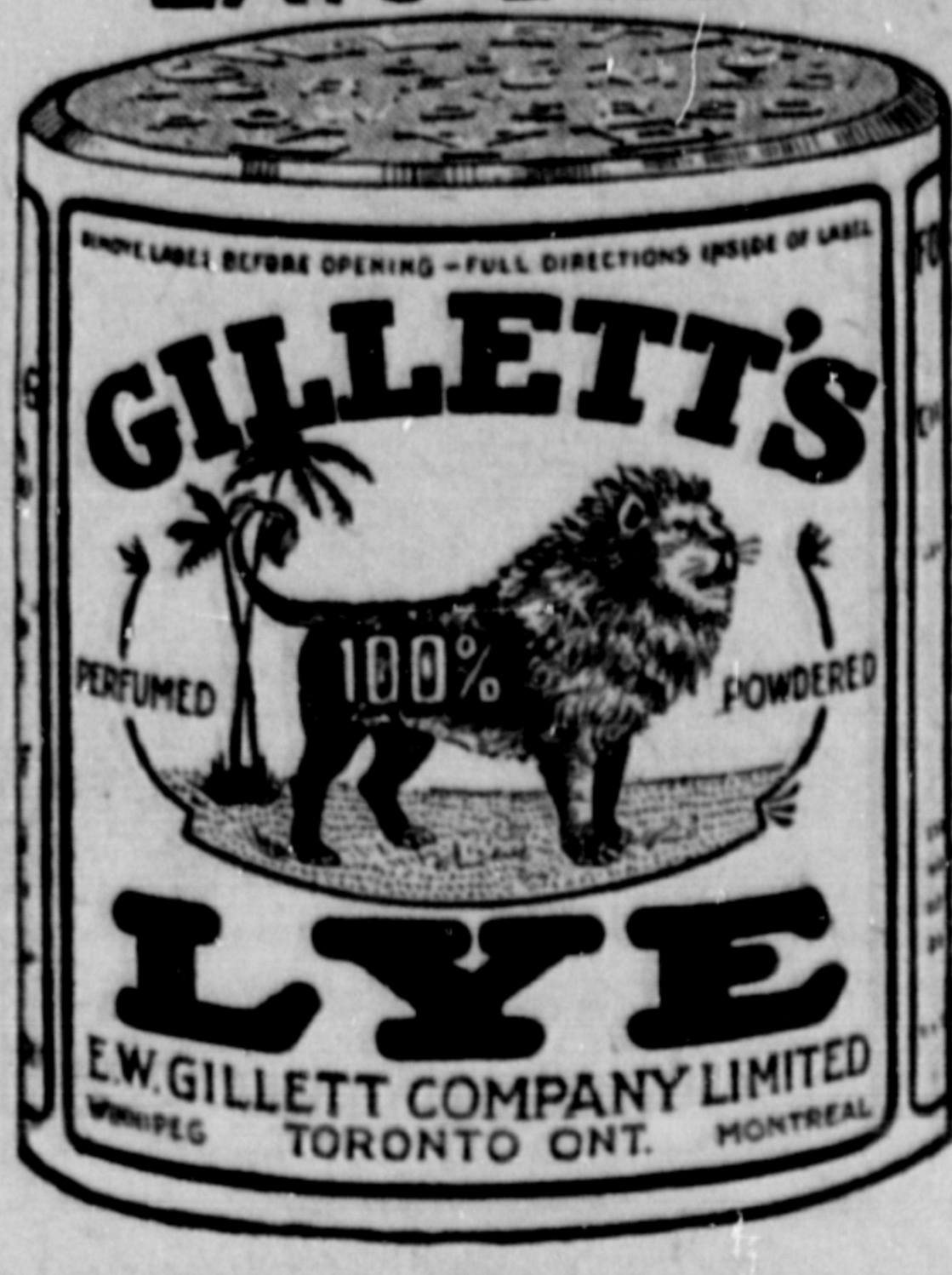

PORT EDWARD WATER WORKS COMPLETED

Sufficient to Supply Industries and a Population of 10,000 People

Today sees the completion of the system of water supply at Port Edward, on which contractors have been at work for the last three months. The President of the Dominion Wood Pipe Company, of New Westminster, left Port Edward ten days ago after having superintended the laying of the wood stave wire wound pipe furnished by the company. The size of pipe used ranges from 16 inches in the mains to eight inches in the laterals.

The present installation includes a dam on Wolf Creek, a main extending along the creek and down Harrison St. to 1st Ave., and laterals the full length of 1st Ave., at a cost of approximately \$25,000. It is sufficient to supply industries along the water front as well as a population of over 10,000 people. The Port Edward Townsite Company has now spent approximately \$125,000 in improvements on its property.
