INTEREST TAKEN IN THE NIGHT SCHOOLS

Mayor Pattullo Offers to Aid in Every Way Possible Up to New Municipal Year.

A meeting was held last evening in the City Hall, in connection with the proposed night school for the place. There was quite a fair attendance present, most of them being interested in the movement and ready to take part in the school as pupils as soon as it started. On motion O. H. Nelson, chairman of the school board, was elected to the chair.

He outlined at the start the position in which the school board placed itself. It had decided that next year it would initiate a night school system in the city providing for the instruction that is authorized by the department of education, being in line with the regular course of studies in the public schools. It was hoped that there would be a ready response on the part of those who would be benefitted by the course which would be absolutely free.

The department provided the books and in large measure provided the necessary funds for the paying of the teachers.

Mayor Pattullo, who was present, also expressed his sympathy with the movement. He said that if it were found that there was not quite the number attending as had been suggested to make it come under the class to be aided by the department at Victoria he would as mayor lend his endorsement to the voting of the necessary funds to carry it along until the end of the present municipal year provided the trustee board endorsed the proposition as a necessary one.

He explained that the city council had not found it possible to vote money to the technical school scheme proposed because the council would then be voting money to be spent by next year's council. The mayor promised further to take care of any expenses that were found necessary with this work.

Wm. Manson, M.P.P., believed the move a step in the right direction. He promised that anything he could do in the way of aiding it would be willingly done.

Mr. Shockley of the committee having the matter in hand explained to what extent the committee had gone. He felt that there would be a good-sized class in the preliminary branches such as the school board would provide for. The difficulty now with was the technical division.

W. Shaw, as another member of the committee, spoke on the subject. He thought it would be well to start up in the line of the preliminary subjects and then let the other follow.

W. Godson was satisfied that there would be a good attendance.

Harrison Rogers was favorable to making a complete canvas, but this was not deemed the wisest course.

It was decided to get out application forms and have a definite enrolment, the trustee board being asked to try to start the movement on or about January 5.

It was decided to go on with the technical end of the work also and this will be more thoroughly looked into by the committee.
