Plaintiff in Slander Case Gets \$10,000 Damages

undertook to chastise the lawyer, but in the crowded court room half a dozen men overpowered him before he could make much headway. The judge then rose and adjourned for the parties to cool off.

At 2:30 p. m. Mr. McLeod was again on the stand, and referring to the Elkins incident said that when Elkins came to him about it, in view of the trouble in the church, he had felt suspicious and had not told him all he remembered of the matter. It was this that enabled him to rebut the child's evidence by showing that Mrs. McLeod was present.

As regards buying real estate his salary would not pay for, the money was partly Mrs. McLeod's brother's and partly the proceeds of his life insurance policy. He produced a telegram referring to deposit of the money in that bank.

This closed the case. In his address to the jury Mr. Patmore dwelt on the fact that the plaintiff had decided to give up the ministry and study law in May, 1913, and alleged this as a reason why damages should not be awarded the plaintiff. He considered that the evidence of Mrs. Robinson and the Elkins girl proved the defendant's case and that Mrs. McLeod's testimony as wife of the plaintiff was not to be relied on.

Mr. Manson in his address went over the case very carefully from the beginning. He reminded the jury again of the serious nature of slander. Many attempts had been made to destroy the credit of the parties without success and he considered that no man in the presence of his wife should be called upon to answer such questions as had been put to his client without a shadow of evidence.

The Woodstock matter had been ruled out for a very good reason. The action had commenced in August last and even now not a title of evidence had been adduced to substantiate a single particular. If this Woodstock affair had not been mentioned by evil minded persons

Mr. McLeod would still be pastor and the case would never have come up.

The defence pleaded that all these nasty stories were told in the cause of Christ. Was it in this cause that they were told to Mr. Tamkin and Mr. Oakley? The defendant had flatly contradicted every other witness. According to him they were all liars—he only was able to tell the truth. That was a matter of opinion that might well be left to the jury.

The defendant had wanted something done all the time. He was after the man and wanted him driven out of the church. He considered that the Elkins girl was far more familiar with sexual affairs than was seemingly at her tender age. She had been well coached and it was an act of providence that brought Mrs. McLeod to the Brotherhood rooms on the day complained of.

In his opinion the Robinson incident leant on the Woodstock shadow—the Elkins incident on the Robinson one—and the whole three on nothing. Finally he would remind them of Shakespeare's saying: "Who steals my purse steals trash, but he who filches my good name leaves me poor indeed."

The judge in summing up made no comment on the evidence. He defined clearly the legal meaning of slander and charged the jury to bring in a verdict as honorable men free from prejudice. In an action for slander damages might be allowed to compensate the plaintiff and to signify the desire of the jury to penalize the defendant.

This morning Rev. McLeod said: "I brought the action to vindicate my character. A jury of my fellow citizens have heard the evidence and I am satisfied with their verdict."
