Presbyterian Service

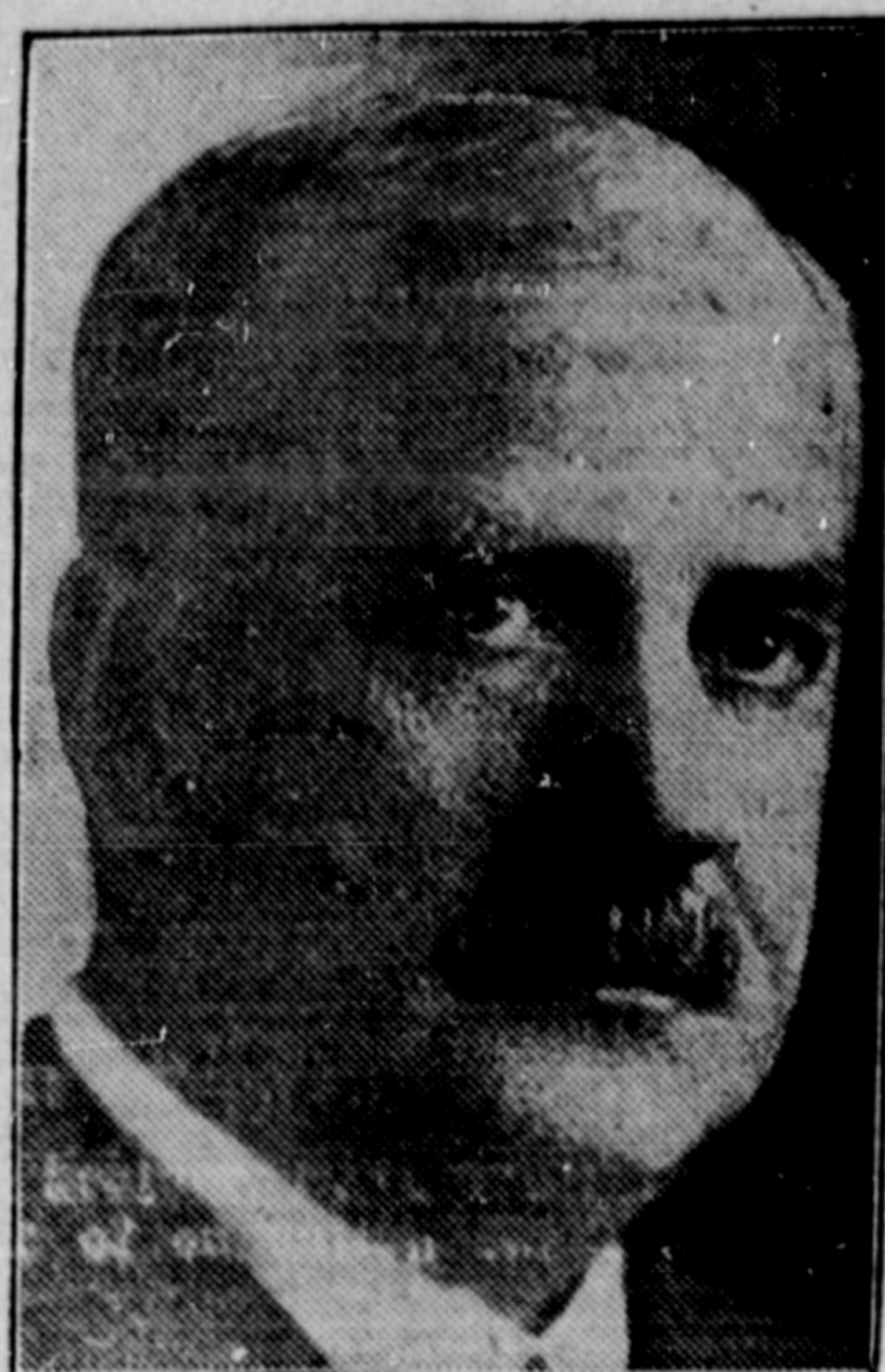

Granby Bay, Jan. 15.—Owing to adverse weather conditions, the blow-in at the Granby Company's smelter will likely not take place for another two weeks. The different works in this connection are rapidly reaching completion, however. The cribbing of the dam is finished, and only a small portion of the filling in remains to be done. Fire has been made in the 135-foot stack, for the purpose of thoroughly drying it out, and another week will see the finishing of the penstock, where the pipe from the dam connects with the iron piping down to the hydro-electric power house.

A benefit dance for A. C. Flanders, one of the company's foremen who recently had the misfortune to fracture his leg, was given in the Recreation Hall Tuesday evening, and the result, with donations made by his many friends, was a presentation of \$610 in cash. MANITOBA ALSO PASSES FREE WHEAT RESOLUTION

Opposition Leader Twits Conservatives on Change of Front

Winnipeg, Jan. 17.—The free wheat resolution introduced in the Manitoba legislature by Mr. C. H. Simpson, a Conservative member, was in debate in the house today. It wound up by the resolution being carried unanimously.

Mr. T. C. Norris, the opposition leader, was the principal speaker, devoting his time to twitting the Conservatives in their change of front since the federal reciprocity campaign. A resolution by Mr. Norris that the resolution be redrafted to read free entrance into the United States of oats, barley and flax and the entrance into Canada of agricultural implements duty free, was ruled out of order.
