G. T. P. Wine Action

Judgment for the plaintiffs was given by Judge Schultz in the action brought by the Grand Trunk Pacific Steamship Company against Messrs. Krause Bros. (the Asbestos Manufacturing Company). The defendants shipped some asbestos to the B. C. Fisheries at Aliford Bay. The goods were sent f. o. b., but the company did not collect at Aliford Bay from the consignees, but subsequently, in accord with its regular practice, billed the consignors. The defence was that the bill of lading was silent on the question of prepayment. The B. C. Fisheries, since the delivery of the merchandise, became insolvent. His honor held that the clause in the Bill of Lading Act, which the defendants relied upon, was not inimical to the plaintiff's claim and awarded judgment in the terms of the pleading.

WOMEN ARE PAINTING FLOWERS ON FACES

Pictures of Horses and Elephants Also Are Seen on Countenances of Russians

Paris, Jan. 18.—Fashionable Russian women are now painting flowers on their faces, declares Sergius Diaghilev, of Moscow. Diaghilev says:

"The fashion was started by Nathalie Goutcharoff, the most celebrated woman painter in Russia. The princesses and other titled women can be seen in St. Petersburg and Moscow, not only with flowers, but with horses and elephants painted on the sides of their faces, foreheads and necks in ultramarine blue. "Nathalie asserts this softens the lines of the face. Now that pearls are so dear, the women are having imitations painted on their necks. The effect is striking."

LOSS ON GREAT LAKES WORST IN HISTORY

Total Fifteen Wrecked, Eighteen Sank and One Burned

The year just closed was the worst for marine losses in the history of the Great Lakes. The loss to boats during the season will run close to \$6,000,000, the largest amount recorded in one season, as well as the largest loss of life.

The greatest disaster of the season occurred on Sunday, Nov. 9, when the great lakes were swept by the worst storm in history, 254 persons going to their death and many steamers being lost. During the year fifteen steamers were wrecked, eighteen sank and one burned to the water's edge.

High Churchmen of Paris Reprove Those Who Participate in Rique Dance

Paris, Jan. 18.—Maurice Maeterlinck, commenting on the tango today, said:

"I consider the moral aspect of the question a secondary matter, but I find fault with the tango because it is not graceful and is silly."

Interdicts were published today by the Archbishop of Sens and the Bishop of Poitiers. The former says: "The tango already is reproved by simple honesty and Christian sentiment." The latter says: "All dances are dangerous, but the tango is the most daring of all. Are we returning to paganism and its shamelessness?"

The boat they were in was capsized by a gale and they elung to the towline four hours before they were rescued.
