### EIGHTEEN APPLICANTS IS THE JOB VACANT

#### City Council Discusses at Length a Job Which Many Want

Ald. Maitland suggested to the city council last evening that it would be fair to advertise in the city papers for a sanitary inspector. Give everybody a chance.

The mayor wanted to consult the chairman, Ald. Kerr, who was out of the city.

Ald. Dybhavn advised advertising in an outside paper as well. It is a serious problem and the city wants a man who understands the business. It might not be possible to find him in the city.

Ald. Dybhavn and Ald. Bassobert submitted a motion to that effect.

Ald. Montgomery thought it would be well to find out if there was a vacancy first.

The mayor said the inspector was only appointed temporarily and the chairman should decide whether there was a vacancy or not.

Ald. Morrison said that according to the communications received a week ago there was a vacancy.

Ald. McClymont said that just picking up a man on the street would not fill the bill. The applicants should present qualifications.

Ald. Morrissey said there was no vacancy. He hinted that the present incumbent of the office had given some dissatisfaction through misunderstanding his instructions.

Ald. Dybhavn knew nothing of the complaint against the officer. He made the motion because he believed the office was only filled temporarily.

The mayor said he understood the man himself only considered the appointment temporary.

The city clerk then pointed out that among the eighteen applications just received was one from the man himself.

This seemed to clinch the argument that it was only a temporary appointment and the motion was amended to empower the chairman of the committee to advertise and have applicants show qualification.

### Wm. George on Trial

Today Wm. George is being tried on a charge of robbing a drunken man of \$100. The case is being heard before Judge Young and will probably occupy all day. At the time of going to press no new evidence had been offered. It is understood the defence will endeavor to show that Richmond spent more money in the bars and down Comox than he testified. The bills he spent on Comox will be produced in court.

### Water Certificate Issued

The city council is in receipt of a communication from the provincial water department stating that the certificate for the water rights on Shawatlans and Woodworth lakes had been issued in favor of the city. The authorities were asked to furnish \$125, being \$25 for registration fee and \$100 for the certificate. These water rights were applied for in 1911 and have just been issued. This is considered by some to be quite rapid work on the part of the provincial water department.

### Thawing Pipes Caused Fire

A plumber thawing pipes in the Heigerson block this morning used a blow torch. Soon after McMeekin's grocery store turned in a fire alarm. The store was full of smoke. The firemen had some difficulty in locating the fire, but discovered it inside the wall, having caught from the plumbers blow torch. The chemical extinguished it.
