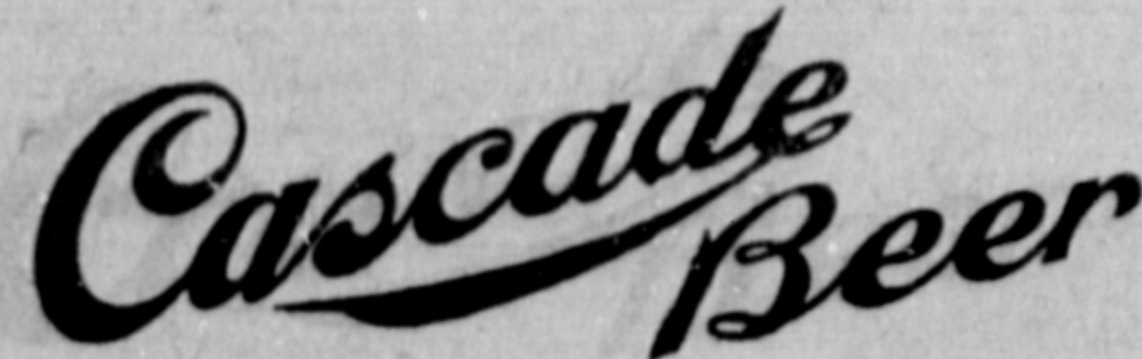

pletion and equipment of the new Connaught wing. The board also thank the various donors of furnishings, supplies and money during the year.

The Ladies' Auxiliary

The board desires to express their thanks to the Ladies' Auxiliary for their very valuable assistance during the year. The tag day and bazaar carried out under their auspices were very successful. During the year they have added considerably to the equipment of the hospital and have advanced a loan to the association of \$400 for the purchase of sterilizers. These are now on order and are expected in a few days.

The training school for nurses is now a recognized branch of the institution and the classes are making excellent progress. The board wish to tender their thanks to the Prince Rupert Medical Association for their kindness in providing gratuitously the lectures necessary for this course of training.

The nursing staff consists at present of a matron, five graduate nurses, eight junior nurses in training and one probationer, but it is the intention of the board to decrease the number of nurses by two so as to secure more economical working. It is very gratifying to the board to put on record their appreciation of the services of the whole staff.

The board would again bring before the notice of the general public the necessity of funds for the upkeep of an institution of this kind. There are only 96 members of the association and this seems to the board a very small membership for a city the size of Prince Rupert.

A very satisfactory report was also received from the Ladies' Auxiliary, showing they had a balance of \$400 in the bank and had loaned \$400 to the association.

The matron's report was also received, and in speaking to it Mr. Nelson said that while there were now five graduate nurses in the hospital they would soon be reduced to three.

In moving the adoption of the general report, Mr. Stephens remarked that he was glad to see the hospital were getting their supplies by tender.

Votes of thanks were passed to the provincial government and the city council for liberal grants; to Wm. Manson for his efforts in getting the provincial grant; to the Ladies' Auxiliary; and to the retiring officers. A vote of confidence in the staff was also passed.

The New Board

The new officers of the association were then elected, and it resulted in the re-election of the old board: Messrs. D. G. Stewart, J. A. Kirkpatrick, C. V. Bennett, G. H. Nelson and Dr. Clayton. Wm. Manson is honorary president. The provincial government and the city council also appoint two members each.
