WOMEN MADE BOLD DASH TO REACH THE CABINET

Militants Got through the Police With Automobile to Premier's Residence

London, Jan. 31.—Militant suffragettes made a bold attempt to break into a meeting of the British cabinet council, sitting at the official residence of Premier Asquith on Downing Street.

An Automobile belonging to the Women's Social and Political Union, with a woman chauffeur at the wheel and filled with suffragettes, dashed from White hall into Downing Street before the line of police, stationed outside the Asquith residence, realized what was going on.

When the driver refused to obey the order of the police inspector on duty to retire from the street, the entire party of women were placed under arrest and taken to police headquarters at Scotland Yard.

The women were later arraigned at Bow Street, where they refused to give their names and were booked under numbers.

ROAD EMPLOYMENT GOES TO FAVORITES

Charges of Partisanship by Provincial Government Made by Farmer Delegates

Victoria, Jan. 31.—Charges of discrimination in favor of "heelers" were made recently by the delegates to the convention of the Central Farmers' Institute. Supervisors, they say, will not employ settlers to work on roads unless they are, in the language of the delegates, favorites.

To appreciate the significance of these charges, it is well to state that 60 per cent. of the settlers on small holdings are forced to work outside during the summer until their land is cleared in order to get money to enable themselves and their families to live through the winter.

Those from the coast and Kootenay districts refused to accept the evasive reply of the deputy minister of lands to the resolution passed here last year, asking that logged-off lands be made available for settlement and referred his reply back for explicit statement.

One delegate from Graham Island says he knows of one company holding 32,000 acres, which they are carrying at book valuation of \$40 per acre, on which under the timber lease they pay 2 1/2 cents per acre.

A delegate named Potter says that he personally knows several cases where would-be pre-emptors have been dealt with in this way. Every diplomatic effort possible to shut off this discussion was made by the convention.

New Fire Arrows

Paris, Jan. 31.—The petrol arrow, cylindrically shaped, weighing two pounds and containing a quarter of a pound of petrol, has just been invented for use as an aeroplane missile by an engineer named Guerre. When the arrow strikes an object an ignition apparatus fires the petrol. The inventor says a fleet of aeroplanes armed with these arrows can blow up a powder magazine or fire a city.
