

#### Vatican Denies Report

Rome, Jan. 31.—The Vatican is indignant at the article which appeared in Le Temps, Paris, saying the pope saw nothing wrong in the tango itself, but objected to the extreme manner of dancing it. The article added the pontiff was booming a new dance intended to take the place of the tango. Vatican officials denounced the story as baseless nonsense. They said the pope has no interest in dances of any kind, and never has discussed matters of such trivial nature with those to whom he granted audiences. The only way in which he has taken action in regard to the tango was by approving condemnation of the dance issued by the cardinal vicar recently.
