All day long a steady stream of trucks and lorries lumber byloaded with boxes, barrels and bales.

One truck I noticed Juj (was the other afternoon was particularly interesting. No two boxes were the same, and stencilled on the end of each was the name of some well-known product-soap, tobacco, socks, breakfast food, cocoa, port, tea, chocolates, perfumery and baking powder.

There, behind that obviously prosaic truck-load of freight was the whole romance of modern commerce—the skilled production, the universal demand for food, drink and raiment, and the world-wide distribution of the things we use every day.

And then I speculated why we use these things every day, instead of some other things; and that brought me plump back to my owr. job of advertising.
