Mr. H. S. Clements, the Dominion member of parliament for this district, visited Prince Rupert for about thirty-six hours just before the municipal elections. Announcement was made at that time that the visit of Mr. Clements was for the purpose of securing additional information with regard to the fishing industry. Since then we have heard nothing of the wonderful things likely to happen to the fishing industry as a result of this visit. Is there not some one who can tell us just what information Mr. Clements acquired upon this occasion as to the fishing industry and who was the source of information?

Was Mr. Clements during this same thirty-six hours able to find out what the excavation work on the new post office site is costing?

How long would it be before the city would be in bankruptcy if it carried out work along similar lines to the excavation work on the new post office site?

A suggestion has been made that it might be well to construct a wooden dam at Wood worth instead of a concrete dam. Action of this nature should not be taken without the most thorough investigation. It is said the present City Engineer greatly favors

the concrete dam. It is certain that a wooden dam must sooner or later be reconstructed. Anxiety to rush through this work for the purpose of bolstering up and giving appearance to an untenable position should not be allowed to jeopardise the best interests of the city. Those who defeated the hydro-electric by-law are beginning to realize what they are up against.

It has been stated that some forty millions was wasted upon the eastern section of the National Transcontinental railroad and this tiny morsel is seized with delight by some who are tickled to death to think that the money may have been wasted. If a Liberal administration is responsible for a waste of forty millions, why a Conservative administration can well afford to waste eighty millions because the cost of living has gone up.

However anyone who would blame a minority of Liberals for acts passed by a Conservative government wouldn't stick at a trifle of forty millions.

Prince Rupert has not heard anything as to what our popular representative at Ottawa is doing for so long that it seems ominous. Wonder whether he is on the job for this

constituency or whether he is putting through a canny deal for the Canadian Northern.

What do you think of trustees of the people whose idea of faithful stewardship is the allocation of the city's water supply to the president of the Conservative Association in Vancouver? Why didn't they give it to the President of the Conservative Association in Prince Rupert?

It is to be hoped that his worship the mayor is keeping a carefully itemized statement of the expenses of himself and the city solicitor during their visit to Victoria. The last time he visited Victoria upon behalf of the city he quite overlooked this important matter.

Wonder what success the mayor is meeting in trying to get an act of the legislature passed to force an expenditure of \$115,000 upon the city without first obtaining the sanction of the ratepayers who will have to foot the bill.

Bowser compelled this city to buy from his Vancouver friends, Wilson et al., all the old junk which remained after the fire at the sawmill at the eastern end of the island. The Liberals had adhered to their resolution not to do so, while their opponents had combined to elect a man for whom they had no respect. He trusted they would see the folly of their course.

The new president said he appreciated the work ahead and the necessity to bring home to the people the desirability for a change of government. Every one feels it is coming. The feeling in Victoria has been changing rapidly. The new Municipal Act was the most iniquitous thing conceivable. The board system as adopted in Saskatchewan was not a parallel to the one-man power at Victoria. That one question ought to defeat the Conservative party. He would rather be president of this association than the leader of such a government as we have in Victoria.

Mr. von Rhys, president of the Stewart Liberal association, made a splendid speech on how Liberals should appeal to the business men of this district. There had been a disappointment in the development of the land, which was in the hands of speculators. Liberals should show business men that orders from settlers are better for them than the little petty graft they get from the government. Ac-

cording to the government's own reports there are one and a half millions of acres of first-class land tributary to Prince Rupert. This is capable of producing \$30,000,000 of products every year. The Liberals have the land plank the first in their platform. At present the development of the country is crippled and the McBride government is perpetuating a policy which will rapidly bankrupt the country.

Bowser and McBride say this country is very prosperous. They are very prosperous and we have made them rich. Victoria parliamentary buildings have been created a big real estate office. British Columbia has resources but they are useless without development. There is less development today than there was ten years ago.

There have been great blunders in the way road work monies have been spent. The province does not get fifty cents value for a dollar spent. He spoke of \$5,000 being appropriated for a trail near Stewart. The road officials spent the money in opening a wagon road to their own pre-emptions. Five hundred and fifty dollars had been charged up to a bridge which could be built for \$50. Another \$5,000 had been spent for a bridge on a road which no one had used in two years. There were slides on that road with 150 feet depth of snow.

He advised having the Liberals adopt a plank in their platform to have the road work done under a commission outside of politics. The money already wasted on roads would give us the finest roads in the country if properly spent.

G. W. Nickerson wanted to see the police and licence departments also under commissions. An informal vote was passed suggesting the road work commission to the coming provincial convention.

Messrs. H. F. McRae, Charles Hastings and others spoke briefly.
