## HARRY HANSON GETS LETTER IN ENGINEERING JOURNAL

WROTE PERSONAL LETTER WHICH EDITOR THOUGHT WAS GOOD ENOUGH TO PUBLISH

The following letter from a well known Prince Rupert plumber was sent as a personal communication to the editor of the Domestic Engineer of Chicago. The letter is characteristic of Harry and the grim humor of it must have appealed to the editor as he published it as follows:

"Editor Domestic Engineering—What show has a plumber, when he starts in business with a debt of \$200 and nothing but a suit of clothes and a kit of journeyman's tools in a strange city with a population of 5,000 and with four established plumbing concerns doing all the business at prices lower than in San Francisco, and this where materials cost more?

"This is exactly what I went up against here in British Columbia. Of course, I could go to work as a journeyman, but when I asked \$5 a day, there was absolutely nothing doing.

"Luckily for me a prolonged spell of cold weather came at this stage of affairs, and this gave me a chance to make about two hundred dollars, after which I waited patiently till I went broke. I then secured a mucking job for 21 days, at 30 cents an hour, on the railroad rather than cut the price on plumbing work. Following this I joined the Longshoremen's union and worked at the wharf at 50 cents an hour. Having time to spare on this job I opened a shop, and took all kinds of jobs that came along. I piled lumber, posted bill signs and acted as messenger for a messenger bureau. After a while one job followed another, until I now have 50 customers on my books and \$200 to

collect, with bills payable \$150; material on hand, \$150; bank account, \$32; tools bought and on hand, \$150; and a well-equipped bachelor apartment. Plumbing, bookkeeping, collecting, doing favors and advertising keeps me so busy that I sometimes forget to eat; and now I have a drawer full of letters and bills to go over. Your letter was the third one. The two bones enclosed will answer it. The books you sent me so promptly and your paper are a great help to me. I consider Domestic Engineering the best and most interesting of all magazines.

"While business is not brisk at present, I am busy all the time. My spare time I spend in cutting nipples and in experimenting with water coil propositions. I have ordered a thawing machine for thawing frozen pipes, to be delivered December 1. It surprised me to see no such apparatus advertised in your journal. All the advertisements you carry are of great interest to me, and I expect to be able to order several things that I need but cannot afford to buy at present.

In the last few weeks I have installed fifteen coils in range stoves. By my way of installing them I have been able to heat 40 gallons of water in twenty minutes and draw a bath every fifteen minutes, and in one of my installations with a 100-gallon boiler 100 gallons of water are heated in fifty minutes. Five minutes after lighting the fire in my own little stove I draw water so hot that you cannot put your fingers in it without scalding them. I am creating quite a demand for jobs of this kind, and I

get \$15 for making the coil and connecting it up.

"The other day I did another unusual job. I cut the bottom out of a stove, connected an 8-inch galvanized pipe to it, fixed it up with two dampers, and this is now doing the ash-chute stunt to perfection, saving my customer a lot of travelling up and down stairs. This job cost him \$12 and he is a satisfied customer. I will no doubt get similar jobs from his neighbors. Another job, which I think will be a little out of the beaten track is on my book. This is a little heating system, where I am going to connect a radiator to a range boiler, and I am going to do it in my own way.

"Well, here is the professor from the business college, and it is after 10 o'clock. He joins me in a little collation. Then we have a game of checkers, and I am the champion so far. And now. Good night!

## THE ROAD TO THE RIGHT.

YOU'VE met at least one of those few good old souls, who are constantly getting the worst of it when shopping, who don't believe in advertising. A hundred disappointing and instructive experiences have failed to teach him their plain lesson.

When he bought his first watch he was beguiled into buying one without a known name or a trustworthy guarantee. That watch—a poor timekeeper—cost him dearly by reason of missed appointments and missed trains, and for frequent repairs. Yet he paid the price of a good watch.

This good old soul's case is not unique. Many of us, if the truth be confessed, resemble him; we allow ourselves to be sold merchandise with an unknown brand or trade mark instead of buying merchandise which is well known to us through the medium of advertising. In slang language, we get "stung" pretty often.

In most of these cases we have ourselves to blame, for "the road to the right" thing to buy has been made plain by advertising.

There is no good reason for passing by the known thing, soundly guaranteed, to buy a dubious article, which, quality for quality, cannot be cheaper than the known, branded article.
