LACROSSE THE RING FOOTBALL BASEBALL LAWN TENNIS HOCKEY

With the draw for the Davis cup preliminaries announced, the Canadians being drawn against Australasia, coast lawn tennis officials are endeavoring to have the preliminary round played in Vancouver or Victoria, thus giving coast enthusiasts an opportunity of seeing Australia's famous players.

Kid McCoy, the veteran fighter, who was one of the top notchers of the ring years ago, will try and "come back" on Mar. 14, when he meets Georges Carpentier in Paris. The master fighter of twelve years ago is to meet the latest and most sensational "comer."

That the day is not far distant when Canada will capture the Davis cup, emblematic of the world's tennis championship, is the opinion expressed by Mr. R. B. Powell of Victoria, captain of the Canadian team in 1913.

Connie Mack, the wily manager of the Philadelphia Athletics, who makes a specialty of turning out champion teams, has succeeded in signing up every member of last year's pennant winning aggregation.

Percy Quinn, president of the Dominion Lacrosse association, has announced that the eastern magnates will raid the coast cities for players this season unless Con Jones, with whom the easterners have an agreement, remains in the game.

Hilliard Lang, Canadian welterweight champion, has accepted terms for a fifteen-round bout with Frank Barribeau at the Steveston arena. The pair may be matched for Easter Monday.

Fleider Jones, president of the Northwestern league, says he would consider an offer from the Federals if they would offer him enough money.

Len Turnbull, Buck Marshall, Cliff Spring and Gordon Spring are in receipt of letters from R. J. Fleming of Toronto, asking them to name their own terms for playing lacrosse with the Torontos this season.

The Westminster Lacrosse club cabled arrangements with

the British Columbia agent-general in London to place a wreath on the grave of Lord Minto, donor of the lacrosse trophy which bears his name.

John C. (Hans) Wagner, veteran shortstop of the Pittsburgh National league club, has just sent in his signed contract to club headquarters. It was Wagner's fifteenth contract with Pittsburgh and his eighteenth in organized baseball.

Battling Nelson is holding fast to the property he owns in Hecewich. He recently turned down an offer of \$23,000 for two corner lots.

What's in a name? In Paris the other night Willie Lewis made a fighter named Balzac look like a Mexican soldier beating it for the Texas border.

Victoria hockey players will be regular easterners before they get a chance at the Stanley cup.

Eddie McGoorty, the Wisconsin boxer, now in Australia, will meet Georges Carpentier, the French champion, in a bout in Ireland some time in May. The bout is expected to have an important bearing on their claims to the world's championship. Richard Croker, the former New York politician, is said to have offered a purse of \$20,000 for the battle.

President Joseph H. Tannin of the Boston American baseball league club announced on Monday night that he had Tris Speaker's name to a two-year contract calling for the "largest salary ever paid to a professional baseball player," in addition to a bonus for signing. It is understood Speaker's contract calls for an annual salary of \$16,000, and in addition to this he gets a \$5,000 bonus.

Aston Villa are being acclaimed the greatest uphill fighters in the history of English football, and with good reason. On the completion of the holiday games, Aston Villa were occupying the twelfth position in the standing of the first division clubs. Now they are in second place, challenging the redoubtable leaders, Blackburn Rovers.

W. W. Naughton, the dean of sport writers of the Pacific coast, and known throughout the breadth of the country, died yesterday at his home in San Francisco, of heart disease, after a fortnight's illness.
