COMPENSATION ACT INTRODUCED FOR THE INJURED WORKMAN

IMPORTANT ACT IS INTRODUCED IN THE ONTARIO LEGISLATURE—NO CONTRIBUTION BY EMPLOYEES—GOVERNMENT TO GIVE \$100,000.00

Toronto, March 21.—The Workman's Compensation Bill was introduced in the Ontario Legislature yesterday afternoon by Hon. I. B. Lucas, provincial treasurer. Following are the chief provisions of the bill:

Compensation for total disability calls for weekly payment equal to 55 per cent. of average wage for the previous twelve months.

No contributions by employees to funds directly or indirectly.

Heavy penalty to employers in case premiums are deducted from wages.

"Waiting period" set at seven days. Compensation only allowed if worker is off, due to accident, more than seven days.

Burial expenses, a straight gift of \$75.

Allowance of \$20 a month, where a widow or invalid husband is the sole dependent; \$5 additional for each child up to 16 years.

Farmers Exempt

Farmers are the only employees exempted from the operation of the bill.

The clerical staffs of all manufacturing concerns are included under same liability and rates as other employees.

The board of management is to consist of three members appointed for ten years each. The board is to have exclusive jurisdiction. Its decisions will not be subject to appeal or review in any court, nor can it be restricted, in any way, by injunction or otherwise.

Employers will be grouped for payment to the accident fund.

Fund With Reserves

The board will maintain an accident fund, with adequate reserves to prevent too heavy a burden in the future.

Employers will have to notify the board within three days of any accident.

Mr. Lucas stated that in the Workman's Compensation Act, as it now stands, \$100,000 is the contribution of the Ontario government towards the initial operation of the act.
