SEALING STEAMER FOUNDERED CREW OF 170 BELIEVED LOST

TERRIFIC STORM SWEEP ATLANTIC SEABOARD—ICEBERGS CRUSHED SHIP—SOME ESCAPED ON TO ICE ONLY TO PERISH OF COLD

St. John's, Nfld., April 2.—The sealing schooner Newfoundland has been crushed in the ice south of Belle Isle strait. The greater part of the crew of 170 it is believed has perished.

Steamers which were in the vicinity have picked up several of the bodies. A few of the crew survived, reaching the ice floes, and so escaped when the vessel went down. Fifty of the crew have been accounted for. Most of them were dead when they were found, while others were in a dying condition.

Great alarm is felt for another sealing steamer, the Southern Cross. It is believed that it has also been caught in the ice. The first reports received said that it was part of the crew of the Southern Cross that were picked up and were being brought to port by the Newfoundland.

There are 172 men on the Southern Cross, which was due here on Tuesday. A terrific storm has raged over Newfoundland for three days with unabated fury. The telegraph services have suffered very seriously.

NO DOGGEREL TICKETS FOR G. T. P. RAILWAY

Multiple Route Tickets Introduced by W. P. Hinton, Passenger Traffic Manager

Not a ticket case will be bought this year for the opening this year of 2,000 new stations on the Grand Trunk Pacific railway, for which preparations have begun. The usual assortment of dog-eared tickets will not be on display in the ticket offices of Canada's second transcontinental. This is the result of the successful use of a multiple route ticket, one form of which, by a few deft punches, can be made to serve the same purpose as three hundred different forms of ticket of the time-honored style.

After testing the new form of tickets for three years, the record was found clear as to mistakes, with a gain of 85 per cent in speed and efficiency. W. P. Hinton, who promoted to be assistant passenger traffic manager of the G. T. P., put the time required to get ready a ticket of the new sort at 15 seconds.

The preparation for traffic for the new transcontinental will involve agencies extending around the world and the instructions will be given in many tongues, for both passenger and freight traffic will originate in Europe and from the Orient.

PRISONER ESCAPED FROM HAZELTON JAIL

Knocked Constable Down and Ran Out With Rifle—Well Known Rancher

From Hazelton comes word of the most daring act of a prisoner held there, by the name of Pekel. The full details are not obtainable, but enough is known to establish the fact that he made his escape after knocking down Officer Peters of the provincial police and seizing a carbine as he went out.

The man is well known in the district and his recapture is expected. He had a pre-emption and lived on it in a cabin near Hazelton. He was arrested on Sunday night for housebreaking near New Hazelton, and was taken to jail at Hazelton.

Yesterday morning Officer Peters came on duty and entered the jail to take the prisoners out to work. As he opened the cell door for Pekel, the latter struck the guard on the back of the head and felled him to the ground. He then pushed the officer into the cell and shut the door, making good his own escape, and taking a 30-30 carbine as he passed out. The gun was not loaded and he had no ammunition, therefore, with him.

Two of the other officers who were upstairs were aroused and came down, but too late to get the man before he escaped. He is now being sought.

GRAND TRUNK MEN ACCEPT NEW WAGE SCHEDULE
