Some method of co-operative marketing of the produce of the lands along the Skeena river and elsewhere tributary to this city will have to be found. At the present time tons of potatoes and turnips are lying rotting in the interior country, while Prince Rupert receives the bulk of her vegetable supply from the state of Washington. In other instances the ranchers still hold last year's crops unmarketed. The whole situation requires careful study, and it is the duty of this city to co-operate in every possible way with the people of the interior to a profitable solution of the difficulties of the present state of affairs.

cal machine known as the Bowser-McBride crusher is felt quite as keenly in the interior country as in Prince Rupert. With mines not yet on a paying basis and with products of the farm unmarketed, the people of the interior are not overly flush with money, and they are looking eagerly for the government to spend some of the large amounts which the government has collected from the interior country. The boldest has hitherto held his breath for fear of government disfavor.

to which the district is entitled.

Today only a small portion of the money collected is being spent in the interior districts, and such as has been spent has been wasted or used to build trails to the properties of the favored few. And still there isn't a decent road in the district. The road bosses who spend so large a portion of their time in Prince Rupert have seen to that.

There is no doubt whatever but that many of the recent bank robberies must be laid at the door of the department of justice of this province.

In the Hazelton district murderers go unpunished, thieves remain uncaught, while others who have been caught escape, and the people look with disdain and contempt upon the administration, or rather lack of administration, of law and order in these parts.

Recently at New Hazelton the people were forced to take the maintenance of law in their hands, and two killed and four wounded was the price that had to be paid for the laxity of the department presided over by the attorney-general of this province.

Quite properly the people of New Hazelton held an indignation meeting to voice their protests.

From past experience it seems quite certain that the only remedy for the whole situation is to drive out of office an administration which has become so corrupt as to bring shame and disgust to right-thinking people of every political shade.

Everybody in this city knows that politics is at the bottom of the disbanding of the Earl Grey's Rifles. It is perfectly useless for the local politicians responsible to protest that such is not the case as nobody believes them.

The one man who could do more for this district than any

other has done it more harm than any other dozen men. With him the public welfare has been made subservient to imagined political advantage. Instead of standing up for and fighting for the rights of this district, he has succumbed to the dictatorial arrogance of his masters at Victoria. Instead of being the stalwart champion of the rights of the people, he is the champion apologist of the subversion of those rights. But the day of reckoning is at hand, and the man who is responsible for the unhealthy antagonisms which exist in Skeena district will reap as he has sown.

It seems a great pity that a district rich in natural resources should be hampered and kept back by a few unscrupulous politicians who would not hesitate to ruin their neighbor either to satisfy their vindictive animosity or to further their own personal or political prestige.
