## HUERTA REFUSES TO SALUTE UNITED STATES FLAG

### DARING HOLD-UP ON FIFTH AVENUE LAST NIGHT--FINANCE MINISTER GETS CHEAP NOTORIETY

#### HUERTA WILL NOT SALUTE FLAG MAY MEAN WAR WITH STATES

##### CONGRESS WILL PASS ACT TO ENABLE MUSTERING OF THE MILITIA--FOREIGN GOVERNMENTS NOTIFIED

Washington, April 20.—Huerta has refused to accept President Wilson's demand to salute the American flag. In refusal he last night he countered with conditions. The officials said these would not be accepted and the program of reprisal should be carried out. Secretary Tumulty announced at 11 o'clock last night that President Wilson had instructed an over long distance telephone call a special meeting of the cabinet for 10:30 today. Mr. Tumulty announced that the president was preparing to deliver a special message to congress today and that a joint session would be held at the earliest possible hour, probably 3 o'clock. The matter is closed, said Mr. Tumulty. Huerta, he added, had refused for no continuation of negotiations and refused flatly to agree to what he called a demand for an unconditional salute.

unconditionally saluted, because the flag was not insulted as it was not flying from the launch, and the marines were set free even before the investigation and the officer responsible for the arrest was himself arrested and held for trial.

Washington, April 20.—The breach that finally has come with Mexico will make it impossible, it was declared today on high authority, for the United States to further protect foreigners in that republic, and foreign governments have been notified of the situation in this regard.

Interesting Addresses at the Last Session of British Columbia Teachers' Convention

#### NEW TREATY BETWEEN BRITAIN AND STATES

All Disputes to Be Referred to a Commission--Details Are Not Yet Arranged

Washington, April 20.—Sir Cecil Spring-Rice and Secretary Bryan discussed the outline of a peace commission treaty to bind the United States and Great Britain to submit to the commission for examination and issues between the two countries which would not yield to diplomatic adjustment. It will take a little time to perfect the new convention because of its application to Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and Newfoundland, each of which have to be consulted.

convention of the B. C. Teachers' institute in Vancouver last week. Dr. Walter C. Murray of the University of Saskatchewan spoke on "Education and Heredity," and Rev. Dr. Ebor Crummy talked on the development of character and personality as one of the purposes in teaching.

Just as educated parents have bright children, said Dr. Murray, illiterates are generally followed by another generation of low mental capacity. While education cannot supply such characteristics as energy, intellectual vigor and strength of will, he said that these could be moulded in such a way as to be of the best use to their possessors. Since the character of a race did not depend solely on the physique of its people, there was a mission in the school that most people overlooked.

Dr. Ebor Crummy pointed out to the convention that the fundamental duty of a teacher was not to teach the rudiments of reading, writing and arithmetic, but to develop character and personality. Men were not to be mere nonentities crammed with book knowledge. Stupidity, he said, could be dispelled in a boy or girl at an early age.

Mr. H. B. King spoke on the problem of grading. It was decided at a prior session of the convention that the "leaving" standard at high school was not high enough for students intending to take up teaching as a profession.

#### ALLEGED SECOND AVENUE BURGLAR MAKES ESCAPE

No Proper Accommodation for Prisoners at Police Station

Owing to the lack of accommodation at the police station, one of the men held for the burglary on Second avenue escaped early this morning. As was reported previously, the men did not agree in their stories, so in order to prevent collusion it was necessary to confine them separately at the station. This was only possible under present conditions by keeping one of the men, O'Reilly, in the kitchen. He was seen and spoken to by one of the officers at 4 a. m., and was visited thereafter every fifteen minutes until 7 a. m. The officer naturally did not wake the prisoner on each visit, but looked through the bars to see if he was in bed. At 7 o'clock when the man did not get up, an investigation was made and it was found that he had rigged up a dummy in the bed, using cooking utensils, etc.; had picked the lock and escaped through the boiler house. It is thought that he got away on the City of Seattle this morning.

#### LOCAL ALDERMAN GETS POLICE COURT PUBLICITY

Trouble Over Local Barber Shop Ends in Fracas and Assault Case Results

Hermas St. Louis, a Fifth street barber, had four of the leading city barbers up in police court this morning charged with assault.

From the evidence it appears that St. Louis has been running a cut-rate shop. To a conference of the local barbers he explained that his trade did not conflict with them, as his trade was largely from the floating "bums" and the cheaper class. One of the other boys said "I understand Ald. Morrissey gets shaved at your shop. Do you call him a 'bum'?" St. Louis would not say this. "Then I'll tell you what I think. Any man who goes around at election time preaching 45c an hour and then goes to a cheap shop to get a shave is a pretty cheap skate." An interchange of compliments followed with the result that the fracas landed in court. The case will be finished tomorrow.

Medicine Hat, Alta., April 20.—Peter Verigin, president, and J. W. Sherbinin, manager, of the Doukhobor community in Canada, arrived here today. London, April 20.—The suffragettes today interrupted the service at St. Margaret's, Westminster. The church officials ignored the women and the demonstration subsided. Many members of the house were present.

Berlin, Ont., April 20.—A report that Miss Annie Noll, who has been missing from Vancouver since last September, had committed suicide in a hotel in New Westminster is not credited by Berlin relatives of the missing girl. The relatives have requested the Dominion police department to institute a thorough investigation. They believe she was murdered.

Moncton, N. B., April 20.—Two little children of Jane Munson were killed with an axe yesterday. Park Sobey, who is alleged to have made committed the murders, also made an attack upon the father. The children were found dead today in his backwoods camp. The authorities believe that he has killed himself.

#### LARGE TERRITORY WILL SOON BE OPENED UP

Line Into Peace River Will Be Opened This Fall--J. D. McArthur Talks

Winnipeg, April 20.—In the course of an interview, J. D. McArthur, the well known railway contractor, stated that the steel was laid from Edmonton to the Lesser Slave lake, a distance of 170 miles, and that the Peace River valley country would be reached this summer. Mr. McArthur gave out for the first time the details of the Edmonton-Dunvegan and British Columbia railway that is opening up the last great west and inland empire, thousands of square miles in extent. He also announced that work would be commenced in the spring on the Great Waterways railway to Fort McMurray, northwest of Edmonton a distance of 350 miles.

#### DARING HOLDUP ATTEMPTED ON FIFTH AVENUE LAST NIGHT

W. B. PROVEN OF AMBROSE AVENUE HELD UP AT POINT OF GUN--ASSISTANCE ARRIVES AND ROBBER ESCAPES

A very daring though unsuccessful holdup occurred last night at 9:30 o'clock on Fifth avenue, almost directly in front of Mayor Newton's residence.

The victim of the attempted robbery, Mr. W. B. Proven of Ambrose avenue, while on his way home from town was suddenly accosted by a man who pointed a gun at him and demanded "hands up." In the excitement of the moment both hands went up as ordered, but upon the opportune appearance of Mr. Philip Linzey, he yelled and ran in his direction. Without a moment's hesitation the assailant, pocketing his gun,

looked to his heels and rushed down Cotton street towards Sixth avenue. The two men at once went into Mayor Newton's house and rang up the police, who in an incredibly short time arrived on the scene in an automobile and went in pursuit of the robber.

The description given of the man is that of a person of medium height, clean shaven, and wearing a soft light grey hat pulled well down over his eyes. This man may be one of the gang who have been burglarizing in the neighborhood recently and it is hoped that the police will effect his immediate capture.

#### WEIRD MONSTER OF THE DEEP CAUGHT BY LOCAL FISHERMAN

LOOKS LIKE A CROSS BETWEEN FISH AND ANIMAL--WILL BE PRESERVED AND PLACED ON EXHIBITION

One of the most interesting specimens of the deep that could be imagined was brought to the city from one of the local fishing boats and exhibited in the office of The Daily News.

Its appearance would lead one to think that it is part animal and part fish. The head is distinctly of the mammal type with teeth similar to a rat's and nostrils very like to those of pigs. It has gills, too, but they are covered up. It has the usual tail

of a fish and the front fins are quite natural. On the centre of the belly, however, there are two fins shaped like herring tails, and beneath these two feet with projecting claws. On the top of the head an organ lies buried in a socket, but which can be raised up, and underneath it is covered with sharp spikes evidently used in time of war.

An attempt will be made to have it preserved and placed on exhibition in the publicity rooms.

#### MR. JUSTICE CLEMENT CONFIRMS AGREEMENT

Judgment Effects Settlement of Long-standing Dispute Between Bishop and Parish

Mr. Justice Clement of the supreme court has given effect to the terms of agreement reached between the Bishop of New Westminster and the parishioners of Holy Trinity church, New Westminster, before the issue came to trial, by handing down judgment confirming the settlement upon the lines agreed upon relating to the disposition of the See house property in the Royal City and the future status of Holy Trinity church in the diocese.

According to this agreement just confirmed by his lordship, the See house will remain in the hands of the trustees to be sold when a favorable opportunity presents itself. When sold the proceeds will be equally divided between the parish and bishop. Holy Trinity church will by the agreement retain the title of the cathedral and a canon will be passed at the next meeting of the diocesan synod conferring this title in perpetuity.

The dispute, which had developed into a supreme court action, was over the ownership of the See house land, the parish claiming sole ownership, and the bishop making a like claim as a corporation in succession to his predecessors. The fight has been in progress for a year or ever since the bishop decided to move his seat from the Royal City to Point Grey and to build a cathedral near Vancouver.

#### C. P. R. WILL CALL AT MANILA HEREAFTER

Will Open Valuable Market for the Products of Canada

Montreal, April 20.—The C. P. R. announces that it will enter the Philippine trade on June 15, when the steamer Empress of Russia will make the Manila port call.

The fastest schedule hitherto from any North American port to Manila has been 28 days, but the C. P. R. with her fast sailings will cut this down to 17 days. The service has been inaugurated at the request of the business men and commercial interests of the United States and the Philippines, and will bring Canada into touch with a valuable new market.
