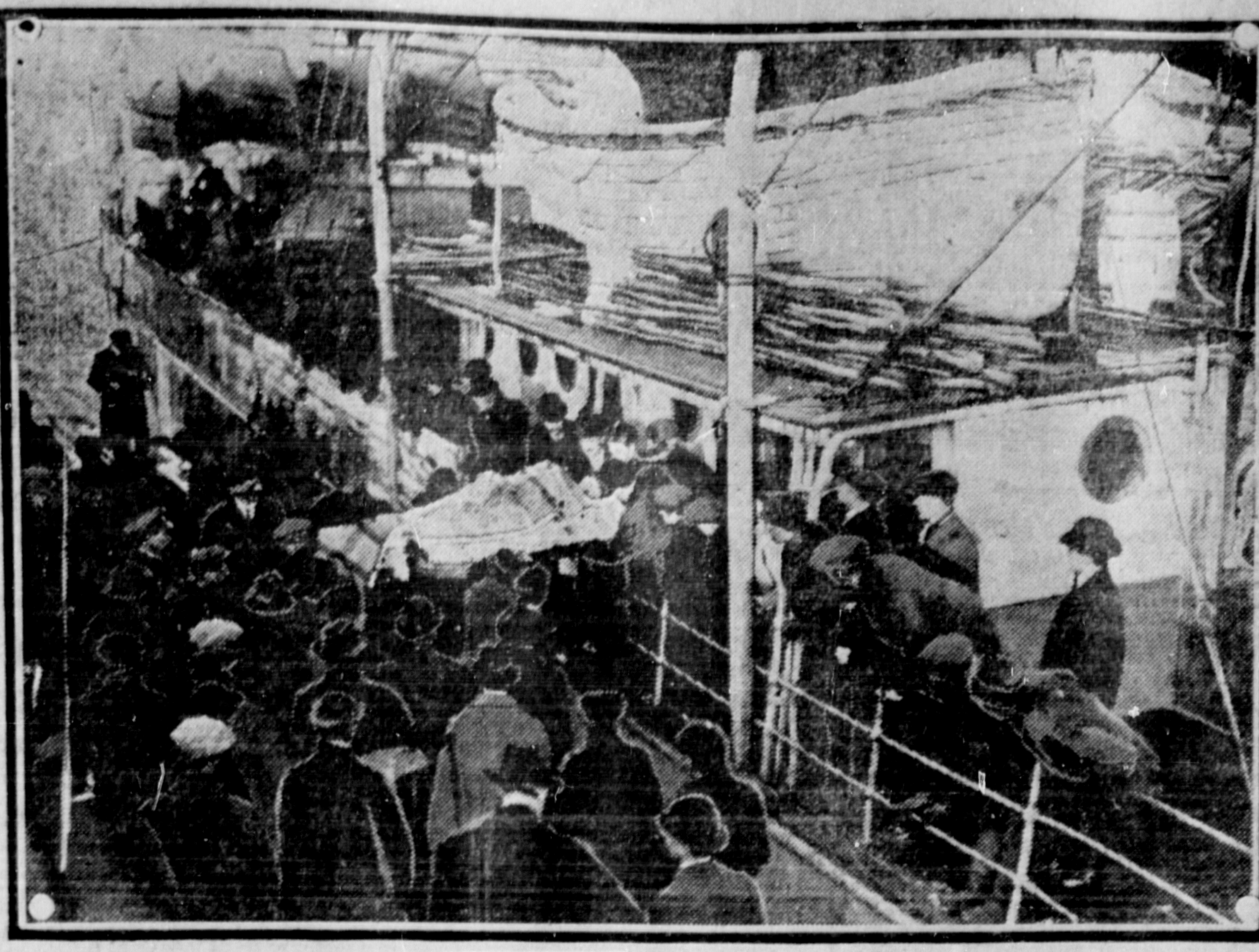

TAKING SURVIVORS OFF THE GREAT SEALING DISASTER

One of the greatest disasters in the history of the North Atlantic seal fisheries occurred at the beginning of this month when upwards of 200 brave Newfoundlanders lost their lives, 170 of them going down when the sealing schooner, the Southern Cross, was crushed in an ice-floe and sank. The others were lost through a terrible blizzard coming up while they were killing seals on the ice floe.

WOULD NOT HAVE CITY TAKE FINES FROM WOMEN

Ald. Montgomery Says Money From Prostitutes Should Not Go Into Treasury

Periodically some alderman takes a shy at the red light district. Ald. Montgomery opened the topic last night by a written question to the chairman of the police commission, who is the mayor. The alderman wanted to know who was responsible for prosecuting the women, fining them \$20 and then letting them go back.

The mayor said the police commission left this question entirely with the chief. If a woman disobeyed rules of conduct she was prosecuted. If she repeated the offence she was made to leave the city.

Ald. Montgomery says he frequently sees in the papers where some keeper was fined \$25. He objected to money from that source going into the city's treasury. It places the city in a bad position morally. He protested against it.

The mayor said there was no system of tribute. The city could finance without that kind of money.

GOVT. EMPLOYEES DRAW DOUBLE SALARIES

A letter received from a satirist at Remo, B. C., being Mile 87 on the Skeena, throws more light on the inefficiency and corruption of the provincial government. Our correspondent reports as follows:

"There is a government ferry at this place and a man is paid to attend to it. There are certain repairs being done to the ferry at present at which four carpenters are employed and consequently the ferry man hired himself out at another job and leaves the ferry to the men who are paid to do carpenter work. We thus have one man getting salary from the government while he is employed on a nearby farm and is thus drawing two salaries, while the carpenters leave the work they are paid to do to attend the ferry."

"A road superintendent, who is a relative of the member for Skeena, told us that it was no use to kick, for the government was satisfied with the ferryman, and that all who didn't like him had better leave the country."

The member for Skeena, who tolerates conditions like this is not a fit man to represent the people. We should have a member who would encourage the development of the country rather than sacrifice the settlers to the greed of party heeled.
