The train from the interior was five hours late last evening. She was delayed by some mud slides going up and did not get into Smithers until yesterday morning.

The customs returns at the local office for April showed the receipts to be \$13,078.41. This is practically the same as what they were last year for the same month. They were \$14,289.04 in 1913.

E. H. Wilson, accompanied by Geo. McNicholl, G. T. P. industrial commissioner, left this morning for New Hazelton where they will visit the mines. Mr. Wilson is a prominent mining man from San Francisco.

Robt. L. Burnap, G.T.R. asst. traffic manager, accompanied by F. L. Norman, commercial agent of the G. T. R., Seattle, and L. Victor Druce, commercial agent of the G.T.P., Vancouver, are expected in on Wednesday's boat.

Work ballasting the line between Smithers and Fort George is now in full swing. There are five steam shovels taking out gravel and between 1000 and 1500 men are distributed among the different camps. It will take at least three months to finish up the ballasting.

Gen. Supt. W. C. C. Mehan states that a large number of people are going into Fort George from the east. There is considerable building going on in Prince George and the town is very busy.

The Chelohsin arrived at 1:30 this morning and then sailed for Granby Bay. When going into Haysport last week the Chelohsin ran aground and damaged her bottom. She will be laid up at the end of the present trip for repairs. This will take her off the run for a week or two.

The deputy minister of works and the provincial architect today have been looking over the site of the new court house on Market place, the site of the Morse creek bridge, and of the road around the island. No definite information as to when these works will be started is available as yet.
