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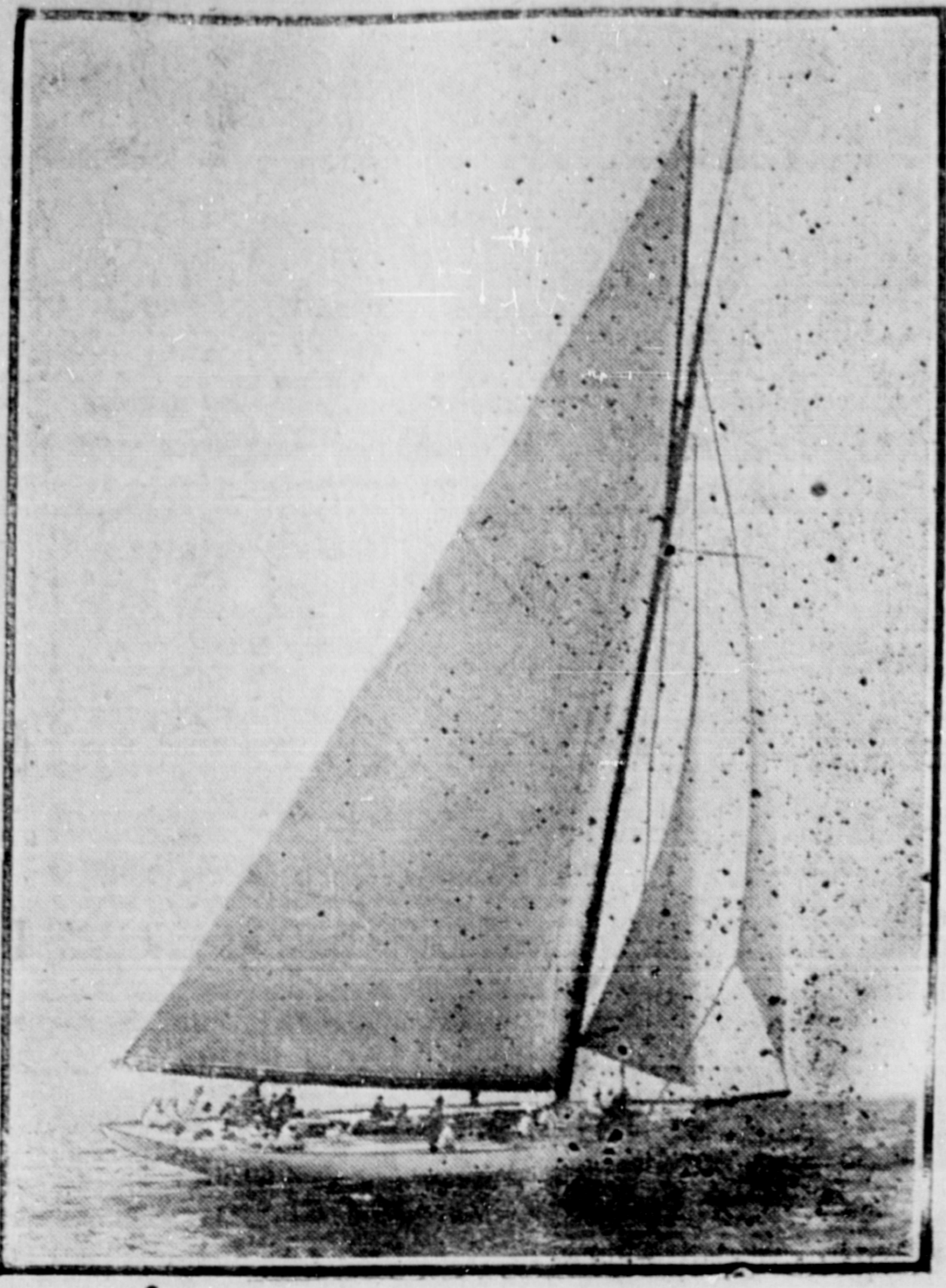
What is the matter with so many of the young women of our age? It surely cannot be that they have joined the ranks of the degenerate, and yet that is the very impression given to the casual observer. Extreme and ridiculous fashions, powder- and paint-daubed faces, and "loud-mouthed" behavior was formerly associated exclusively with the denizens of the underworld. Now, however, it is the craze among people who make a claim at respectability.

The world is always too free to accept people at their "face value" and if those people wish to be classed among the undesirable they are certainly taking the right way about it. The question, however, is a serious one for the nation, and if those concerned cannot secure a reform it may be necessary for "higher-up" influence to be brought to bear.

On May 1, 3,380 hogs were sent from Calgary to the United States in a single shipment. Altogether the twenty-six cars of hogs represented a value of slightly more than \$50,000 which went into the pockets of the Alberta stock raisers. Moreover, while this shipment was the largest ever made from Alberta, many other thousands of hogs in smaller lots have been shipped across the line from that province, as well as from other provinces, within the past few months. This condition of affairs bringing increased profits to the farmers of Alberta,

and adding to the prosperity of the province, also providing purchasing power for the manufacturers of the East, is the direct result of the removal of the American duty on hogs under the Wilson-Underwood tariff. It provides one more proof of the market for Canadian produce which exists in the United States and of the benefit which flows to the Canadian people from wider markets.

Another piece of evidence as to the value of the American market to Canadians was supplied in the Commons a few days ago by a New Brunswick Liberal who spoke of the export of fish to the United States since the removal of the duty formerly levied by the Washington government. From a single New Brunswick county in the month of February there were shipped to the American market no less than 382 tons of smelts. Under the former United States tariff a duty of \$15 per ton was collected and the profits of the Canadian fishermen were consequently decreased on every shipment across the border. As a result of the removal of the duty the fishermen in this one New Brunswick county gained increased sales and increased profits amounting to thousands of dollars. Why shouldn't wheat and other products be allowed the privilege of this wider market? This is a question the Conservatives will be forced to answer one of these days.

**ELOPED WITH STENOGR. AND BANK'S MONEY**

Montreal, May 22.—No clue has been found yet to the whereabouts of Vassal Delmage, a collection clerk of the Merchants bank, charged with embezzling the funds of the bank, or the young stenographer with whom, it is alleged, he fled. Delmage's wife and aged mother refused tonight to discuss his disappearance. Bank officers say they cannot tell yet how much he is short in his accounts, though it is probably not more than a few thousand dollars.

Suspicion is said to have fallen on him two weeks ago and an investigation was started. Evidently he became aware of this for he left hurriedly ten days since, taking with him, it is alleged, besides the stenographer \$1,000. Delmage, who has been with the bank sixteen years, is said to have been speculating in stocks, and also to have been lavishing gifts on the girl.

Fully \$300,000 loss has been caused by the various fires. It is thought that the rain of the past few days will have extinguished the fires.
