A number of objections to the new bylaws for local improvements have been received by the city council. They have all been referred to the court of revision, which sits on the 4th.

The customs returns for the local port for the month of May showed that there were collections made upon dutiable goods entered at this port of \$11,539.

L. Bullock-Webster, secretary of the local exhibition association, has been elected to the position of an honorary vice-president of the Vancouver Exhibition association.

The city council has decided upon the advice of the city solicitor to appeal the judgment of Judge Burritt of the small debts court in awarding Rogers & Black \$82 on an old coal contract.

C. A. Allan has been authorized by the city council to take a number of moving pictures of the city for display in the picture houses of the continent. The appropriation is \$300. The agreement as prepared is not quite satisfactory to the council and will be revised.

The city building permits for May amounted to \$26,500. This is an increase over the same month last year. In fact practically every month shows an increase over the corresponding months of previous years.

E. H. Wilson of California, the mining man who spent a couple of weeks in Rupert recently, was one of the guests on the Admiral Sampson which called here yesterday. Mr. Wilson said he enjoyed the trip up the Alaskan coast immensely, but of all the places he visited he is mostly interested in Prince Rupert. He expects to return here in a couple of weeks to look into some mining properties in the district.

Among the visitors in the city yesterday off the Admiral Sampson was Capt. Grant of Seattle, one of the officers of the Pacific Stevedoring and Contracting Co., who do all the stevedoring work in this port. Capt. P. G. Groves, the local manager of the company, had the pleasure of showing a number of the visitors a portion of the newest and best city on the Pacific coast.
