

## HINDUS MAKE A STRONG APPEAL TO HIS MAJESTY

### PROTEST AGAINST CITY SPENDING MONEY ON PLANK ROADS--SUFFRAGETTES SCARE ROYALTY

#### PROPERTY OWNERS OPPOSED REDECKING PLANK ROADWAYS

COURT OR REVISION ON THE LOCAL IMPROVEMENT BYLAWS  
SENDS QUESTION BACK TO THE CITY COUNCIL  
FOR RECONSIDERATION

The property owners affected by the redecking of the plank roadways in the city are making an effective kick against the work being done. They say the permanent grading will cost less than yearly payments and it is useless to waste money on plank roads.

The matter was brought to the attention of the city council and that august body shifted it over to the court of revision. The court of revision met today and referred it back to the city council. The property owners affected are holding a meeting this afternoon and expect to meet the city council tonight in a body and urge their protest.

The members of the court of revision realize that there is a lot of common sense in the protest put up to them, but the court is only empowered to consider protests against the assessments made under the bylaw and not to consider protests against the bylaw itself.

Ald. Morrissey, who is one of the court, thought all the bylaws should go through as the city was obligated to take the money from the bond brokers, and to withdraw the bylaws now and submit new ones would make "the council appear like ninnyes."

The mayor believed the financial end of it would not be disturbed. He favored reconsideration of those bylaws where the owners want permanent work in place of redecking.

The city engineer showed that in several cases a 16-foot permanent roadway would cost very little more than the redecking of the plank roads.

On Summit avenue and Eleventh avenue the protest is against the entire work.

The assessments on the various bylaws were confirmed, but the bylaws themselves will be discussed this evening.

#### EXCHANGE BLOCK SOLD AND WILL BE REMOVED

One of First Buildings Erected in  
City—Ground Lease Expires  
—Will Be Removed

The Exchange block on the corner of Third avenue and Sixth street has been sold. This building was erected on ground leased for five years by C. D. Newton, and as the lease has now expired the building will have to be removed. All the tenants have received thirty days notice to move out. It is understood that the building will be moved to the corner of Second avenue and Seventh street, where the old school stands.

This building is one of the pioneers of the town, having been built shortly after the Empress theatre and the Alder block. It cost about \$10,000 to build and for a good portion of the period has paid seven and eight hundred dollars per month in rent.

#### Entered a Counter Claim

Montreal, June 3.—The owners of the collier Storstad have entered a counter-claim against the Canadian Pacific railway for \$50,000 in connection with the collision of the collier and the Empress of Ireland, alleging negligence in the navigation of the Empress. The C. P. R. claim against the Storstad, on the other hand, is for \$2,000,000. Each of the captains of the vessels maintains he followed the correct rules laid down, thus putting the blame for the accident upon the shoulders of the other.
