### DISINTERING BODY

Four Men Are Arrested in Act of Disinterring Body of Murdered Woman

Canyon City, Ore., June 18.—Four men were arrested in a cemetery near here shortly after midnight while in the act of disinterring the body of Mrs. Daisy Potts of Los Angeles, whose husband, Charles E. Potts, is on trial here charged with her murder.

Those arrested are Attorney Philip Ashford and Prentiss Hicks, counsel for Potts; Dr. Francis Tate of Los Angeles and Samuel Lyon. Dr. Tate declared he had written permission from Potts to remove the body, and that his object was to learn whether allegations of the prosecution were true that there were evidences of strangulation and a broken neck bone.
