

### Silver Salmon Hybird Thrives

The possibility of crossing the breeds of the king and silver sal mon and obtaining a bigger hybird than either of the parental stocks was credited at the final meeting of the Pacific Fisheries Society last Friday on the university campus by Prof. E. Smith, who has been conducting experiments at the Auborn hatchery. Six thousand silver eggs were placed in king salmon sperm, and four thousand king eggs in silver sperm, and, according Prof. Smith's experiments, the silver hybrid was about 14 per cent larger than the uncrossed silver breed in the same stage of development.

"I found that the hatching period was prolonged and that the rate of mortality in the king hybrid was alarming," said Prof. Smith, "but the rate of infertality in the crossed silver was less than one per cent, and there is certainly the possibility of a larger fish being breed."




