REVIEW OF ASSIZES RESULTS OF TRIAL

Large Number of Cases Disposed of—No Serious Crime—Some Judgments Reserved

The following is a summary of the cases disposed at the criminal and civil settings just closed:

Rex vs. August Johnston; shooting with intent to murder and shooting with intent to do grievous bodily harm. W. E. Fisher for the Crown; Williams & Manson for the accused. Verdict: Acquitted on both charges.
Rex vs. Carter; theft. W. E. Fisher for the Crown; Williams & Manson for accused. Acquitted.

Rex vs. O'Reilly; theft; breaking gaol, and theft. W. E. Fisher for Crown; no one for accused. Acquitted on first count; conviction on second two. Sentenced to five years for theft and two years for breaking jail.

Rex vs. Wilence; forgery; uttering forgery, and travelling on false ticket. W. E. Fisher for Crown; Williams & Manson for accused. Acquitted on first two charges; conviction on third. Accused discharged from custody, having been sentenced to days in gaol already served.

Rex vs. Hall; shooting with intent to murder, and shooting with intent to do grievous bodily harm. W. E. Fisher for Crown; Williams & Manson for accused. Acquitted on first count; conviction on second. Accused discharged from custody, having been in gaol several days while waiting bail after preliminary hearing.

Philpott vs. Beatty and Prince Rupert Fish & Cold Storage Company. Motion by Beatty for postponement of trial, and commission to take evidence of himself and Frank S. Evans in Toronto. Peters, K.C., for Philpott; Manson for Prince Rupert F. & C. S. Co.; Fulton for Beatty. Postponement granted; commission refused. Beatty to pay costs of motion to Philpott and Fish Company within one month.

Burroughes vs. Harrison; motion by Harrison to postpone trial. Fisher & Warton for Harrison; Williams & Manson for Burroughes. Postponement granted. Harrison to pay costs of motion.

Kelly, Douglas and Continental Trust Company vs. L. J. & F. B. McArthur; Williams & Manson for plaintiff; no one for defendants. Judgment setting aside conveyance of Victoria lots from

L. J. to F. B. McArthur (wife to husband), and directing conveyance to Continental Trust Co. for benefit of creditors of Mrs. McArthur.

Benson vs. Clayton, Williams & Manson for Benson; Fisher & Warton for defendant. Judgment by consent for \$5,000 odd for plaintiff and for a vendors lien on a Third Avenue lot sold by Plaintiff Benson to defendant.

Shepherd vs. Shepherd and Douse; divorce action. Williams & Manson for petitioner. No one for respondent or co-respondent. Divorce absolute granted. Costs against co-respondent.

Tullidge vs. Beveridge; action claiming interest in estate of late Mrs. Tullidge. Williams & Manson for Tullidge; Fisher & Warton for defendant. Judgment for Mrs. Beveridge.

Ritchie vs. City of Prince Rupert; action by Ritchie to prevent city cutting off private sewer. Patmore & Fulton for Ritchie; Peters, K.C., for city. Judgment for Ritchie.

McNeill vs. Gillette; action for damages for personal injury; jury trial. Patmore & Fulton for plaintiff; Williams & Manson for defendants. Plaintiff's action dismissed. Judgment for defendant for costs.

Mason vs. Prince Rupert Publishing Company, Ltd. Peters, K.C., for plaintiff; Williams & Manson for defendants. Jury trial. Verdict for plaintiff for \$1 damages. Costs reserved.

Broderous vs. Hamblin; action for slander. Williams & Manson for plaintiff; Patmore & Fulton for defendants. Judgment for plaintiff for \$200 and costs.

McLeod vs. McFarlane; action to set aside transfer by McFarlane to his wife of Sixth Avenue

CANADA WILL HELP

Will Establish Fuel Stations for Air Race
New York, June 25—The Canadian Government will establish fuel and supply stations on the Labrador and Greenland Coasts for the round-the-world aeroplans, which will fly from the Panama-Pacific Exposition in San Francisco next year. This was announced here today by Arnold Kruckman, who arrived here yesterday after following a proposed route of the race from California to the Atlantic Coast by way of Chicago, across several of the Great Lakes and the St. Lawrence River. If this course is selected, Philadelphia, New York and Boston will not see the contestants as was originally planned.
