In a report recently issued by the Dominion Department of Labor there appear several statements which lend support to the Liberal policy of wider markets. "The passing of the new (American) tariff bill early in October (1913)" the report points out, "led to heavy | shipments of cattle being made" from Canada and "the opening of the American market to Canadian cattle by the removal of the tariff was followed by an upward movement (in prices) throughout the last three months of the year."

In 1911, when the Liberals sought to give the Canadian farmer duty-free access to the American market, Mr. Borden and his associates went up and down the Dominion declaring that such access would be of no benefit to our producers. It would be of no benefit, they said, on one platform, because the Americans produce so much themselves that they will not buy from Canada. On another platform they argued that access to the United States market would be of no benefit! to Canadian farmers because prices across the line were lower than they were in Can-

Today we have a department of the Borden Government admitting in an official report that when the entry of cattle to the American market was made duty-free under the Wilson-Underwood tariff last autumn "heavy shipments" of Canadian cattle were immediately made. There were two reasons for the shipments. One was because the United States offered a market for surplus Canadian cattle; the other was that the price paid in the United States yielded the Canadian farmer a good profit. Clearly, then, it is evident that Liberals stillstand.

The report makes another comment upon the result of the opening of the American market to certain Canadian products. "In the spring of 1913," it says, "when it appeared probable that wool would be allowed to enter the United States free of duty, the price in Canada advanced to the level expected on the United States market, and the Canadian clip of 1913 was bought at prices anticipating this level. The mere fact of the possibility of the opening of the American market to Canadian wool was sufficient, then, to gain higher prices for the wool which the sheep-raiser had for saleanother piece of evidence indicating the value of that market to the producers in Canada.




