## VILE WORK OF HUMAN DEVILS IN FAR PERU

London, July 25.—All the London morning papers make a feature in big headlines of the Peruvian rubber scandals. The Express says editorially of the blue book on the subject that it is an appalling report that is presented by Sir Roger Caseman. The story of the acts committed by the agents of the Peruvian Amazon company in the collection of rubber at Putumayo is simply sickening. This vile work of human devils surpasses even the atrocities of the Congo and sheds a horrible light on the possibilities of human depravity. The Daily Telegraph says it is long since such a story has been unfolded for the shame of the country. The grimest record of the Congo can show nothing worse. It is a tale of inhuman atrocity to freeze the blood.

The Daily News says: "It rests primarily on this country and the United States to bring such pressure on Peru as to cause that government to bring swift retribution on the criminals. The Daily Chronicle says the Congo never provided such a story of Satanic fiendishness or of humanity so depraved by the lust of money-making. The Times says: "The horrors which are revealed must stir the anger and compassion of all."

## BRITISH FIRST LORD TAKES IMPRESSIVE VIEW OF THE RISE OF THE GERMAN BATTLE FLEET

London, July 24.—The speech of Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, in introducing the supplementary naval appropriation of \$5,000,000 in the House of Commons the other afternoon, fully endorsed as it was by the Prime Minister,

will cause greater concern in the country than any warnings which have gone before. Without the least offensiveness the first lord of the admiralty sketched the "unprecedented" rise of the German fleet, which he described as extremely formidable.

Mr. Balfour, the former leader of the opposition, was prompt in his speech on the government programme.

"Those who have listened to the speech of their first lord," he said, "must now be convinced that there is no use talking about dropping our ship building. The cost of the navy must increase so long as insane competition in ship building goes on elsewhere." A notable feature of the debate was Premier Asquith's call to the dominions to join in the defense of "our common heritage," and his remarks foreshadowing an early summoning of the statesmen of self governing colonies to participate in determining the policy of the empire.

Mr. James Ramsay MacDonald, Labor member for Leicester, said that neither Germany nor England could long stand such a strain on their finances, and he declared that British Laborites would join the Laborites of Germany in opposing the constant increase in the naval appropriations.

Lord Charles Beresford criticized the increase in the naval programme as insufficient. He prophesied that the country would go on adding more ships each year, but not enough—just sufficient to induce Germany to follow suit until war came.

There is just a possibility that Frankie Burns of Oakland may get the chance to go on with Murphy instead of Attell, who, it is asserted, will never be permitted to fight in San Francisco again.

Los Angeles, July 25.—Negotiations are under way for a twenty round bout between Abe Attell, former featherweight champion, and Harry Thomas for August 3rd. Thomas appears to be the only legitimate opponent for a match. If arrangements can be made, the boys will sign within the next forty-eight hours. Thomas fights at about 128 pounds.

## WARSHIP ON HER TRIAL TRIP RUNS ASHORE
