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Mineral Development Will Help Rupert (Continued from Page 1.) associated with the other minerals. Assays run from \$8 to \$125 a ton.

Only a few days ago a cross-cut tunnel toward the hanging wall was completed, and exposed good ore for the last fifteen feet of its course, and at a depth of 13 feet.

The proposition offers great possibilities for cheap mining; as an adit which will gain almost foot for foot in the most convenient way of opening up the property, and the vertical distance between the lowest outcrop and the summit is nearly four thousand feet.

The claims were located in 1910 by Pete Neilson, Emil Olsen and others, of Hazelton.

Nearby and across the creek is the well known Buckskin group, which was located by Frank Martin four years ago and owned and worked by himself and associates since that time.

There are reported to be a number of properties with good showing in that vicinity and the recent developments on the Clark property will stimulate owners to something more than performance of assessment work only.

These claims are all scarcely more than twelve miles from the main line of the G.T.P., with an easy approach along the bank of the Bear river.

Mr. Clark outfitted yesterday for a trip to the property with supplies and men to continue the work for the rest of the winter.

Storm Tossed Passengers Rendered Old Hymn When Disaster Threatened Their Ship.

New York, Feb. 15.—A cable to the Tribune from London says: "During a terrific gale between Cape Town and Hobart the passengers on the liner Nainshire gathered together while one of them sang 'Rock of Ages.' In the meantime the women and children were screaming a description and the vessel was rolling fearfully.

About midnight a huge wave tore off the skylight facing the saloon door, and huge volumes of water threatened to drown the women and children within.

"There were many miraculous escapes. One officer with a little girl in his arms had to climb the rigging to avoid a wave which threatened to wash himself and his charge overboard.

An 80-year-old man was flung from the deck to the cabin. Sea after sea was shipped, but the crew worked like horses. They had only one biscuit apiece from Tuesday evening until Thursday.

"An appreciation of the remarkable seamanship of the captain took the form of an address, which was signed by all the passengers on board and presented to the captain when the vessel reached port."

Mr. Fraser, who is one of the popular young men of Atlin, was met on the wharf by a number of his friends late of the north, including several of the fair sex. He expects to return in about a month.

James Cullins, manager and editor of the Masset Leader, returned to the islands on Saturday, booking passage on the steamer British Empire. Mr. Cullins was glad to get away to the scene of his activities at the island capital and gladly availed himself of the opportunity provided by the British Empire, although the latter is not the most palatial of passenger boats.

The herring fishing boats Yankee Boy and Rosine left for their headquarters at Vancouver on Saturday, the season being over for the putting up of the fish for human consumption, the herring having become soft and flabby. The catch now will be frozen and used solely for halibut bait.

J. F. Pooler, local manager for P. Burns & Co., has lately returned from a very pleasant vacation spent in Eastern Canada and the United States.

J. J. Brite, a well known Alaska mining man, who has the reputation of being one of the best "mushers" in the north, at present located upon Ruby Creek, Alaska, spent a day or two in the city recently on his way to the outside.

Mrs. Bain, wife of D. M. Bain, the well known photographic artist of this city, left last Saturday, accompanied by her children, for Southern California. 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SPANISH PRISONER FRAUDS UNEARTHED

Gang Responsible for Swindle Run Down by Madrid Police.

London, Feb. 15.—According to the Madrid correspondent of the Daily News, the police have succeeded in discovering the gang of swindlers responsible for the "Spanish prisoner" frauds. The gang, which is admirably organized, began operations eight years ago. The chief was Eustacio Rieco, proprietor of a house at 18 Luchane street. He was assisted personally by his brother-in-law and his private secretary, Guillermo Sanjuan. Rieco's house was specially built for the purpose of fraud. It was provided with false doors and secret rooms, etc., in order to baffle the police. Every day hundreds of letters were dispatched to the far corners of the earth, inviting foreigners to lift the treasure hidden somewhere by a bankrupt prisoner in Madrid. The victims were invited to telegraph some bogus address here. Then an outdoor agent of the gang, Antonio Ortega, a former telegraph messenger, was directed to bring the message. Ortega's task consisted in bribing the telegraph messenger boys, who received a crown for each telegram delivered to the city. His task was greatly facilitated by the miserable salaries which the messengers received. After several weeks of hard work by the police, Sergeant La. tone succeeded in arresting Ortega at the very moment when he was receiving in an obscure street nine telegrams from a messenger boy. On the way to the police station the prisoner tried to bribe the sergeant, but later made a confession.

NEW PRESIDENT TAKES HIS OFFICE San Salvador, Feb. 15.—Carlos Melendez is stilled as president of Salvador republic, following the assassination of President Araujo. Melendez was the first alternate president selected at the last election, and thus takes the presidency over the head of Vice President Duran. The new executive is generally popular.
