Railroad Question Hangs in Balance.

Now that the shipbuilding plant is once more in operation and the other industries of the place seem to be in pretty good condition, it would tend to better business to have the railway question settled. It is to be hoped that something definite will develop this session.

It is generally understood that the visit of Sir Alfred Smithers to Ottawa is to conclude final arrangements with the Government for the railway. They will either sell out or make arrangements to continue, but the general feeling is that the Government will take it over.

***** IN THE LETTER BOX ***** SCHOOL BUILDING

To the Editor:—

Mr. Alder's suggestion that so far as possible Prince Rupert material be used on the new school building is one that a lot of people will agree with. Concrete is just as good looking a material as brick and concrete blocks might be used and they would be cheaper than bricks.

If it is true that bricks cost sixty dollars a thousand in Seattle and that concrete bricks could be made for forty or less and that the concrete is just as good if not better, then I for one should like to see the local rock used if only to get it out of the way.

The Prince Rupert Hotel is made of brick and it is a good building, but it would be just as good if it was made of concrete made with a hollow inside so as to keep the building dry.

Buy at Home.

I am glad the people of Prince Rupert passed the bylaw and I hope the contract will be let as soon as possible, but I should like to see it built right. The trustees deserve a lot of praise for their work, but they should be willing to take suggestions from outsiders and not be too pigheaded. The Government wants us to buy at

home and here we go and send away to the States for building material when it is right here on the spot. All we have to do is to dig down and we can get plenty of bricks just as strong and just as good looking as those American ones that the trustees would bring in here. There is a lump of rock on the athletic grounds that could be ground up and made into good bricks mixed with a little cement.

Foreign Material.

I do not like Mr. Bruce and his ways, but I do think he told us something worth listening to when he told us that concrete bricks was just as good as American bricks and because we do not like his queer ways of advertising himself is no reason why we should not use the concrete for this school building and build it cheaper and get it done just as well as if it was done with foreign material. This school is for British boys and let it be built of British cement mixed with good British rocks and then we can hoist the British Jack on top of it and stick out our chests and sing "Britons never will be slaves."
