



# CALLIES AGAIN CARRY HONORS AT FOOTBALL

### Win From Sons of England in Close Game by Score of 1 to 0.

The football game last evening between the Sons of England and the St. Andrew's Society was won by the latter by a penalty score of 1 to 0. From the very outset both teams were playing well and it was plain to be seen that it was a fight to gain the prestige of the league. The crowds cheered lustily and the most rooting was in favor of the Callies as the Sons are leading the list now and another victory would have given them too much of a lead. The game was marked especially by fast work all round and in one minute the ball passed from one fortress to another and the oppressors rushing in. Bill Murray won the toss and chose the steep grade in the first half.

The excitement of the first half culminated when the ball bounced against Bennett's hand in the penalty box. Johnny Robinson took the ball, put it in place and the St. Andrew's supporters looked blue. The whistle was blown and the red shirted kicked but the ball soared harmlessly above the posts, much to the relief of the Scotch goalie, Martin. The play continued about tit for tat with the rose upholders unable to break through the Callie half back line.

At the first sound of the whistle after a brief period, all the players were off, with the Callies showing up particularly aggressive on the down hill push. More than once did they break through but the inside right, Pennycook, was too long in getting the ball away and too often was the opportunity of scoring lost through failure to shoot. Many corners were gained in the second half by the Scotches, but by no effort could they get the ball into the net. Try as they might the leather always seemed to find its way to an Englishman's head and a tense situation was over. Jack Judge, the English goal keeper, saved many good shots, especially from Williseroft, who put in two or three good ones in the last few minutes. It was time for the Kiltie descendants to "hooch," however, when they got a penalty against Robinson, the Sons centre half. Bill Murray strolled down the field with confidence and easily placed the ball in the net. This won the game for the Callies.

Jack Smith of the G. T. P. team was referee and was very impartial and checked up the fouls very closely. Some of his off side decisions were received with awe at times, but there was no time to grumble last night. The idea was football and it was played for all it was worth.
