CALLIES DEFEATED IN HOT CONTEST

Merchants Won by Good Margin and Much Money Changed Hands

The final tie in the City Football Cup Competition took place last night at the Drydock grounds when the Merchants played the Callies before a fair gathering of spectators. The teams were as follows: Merchants: Youngman; Murray and Dudson; Garnet, J. Currie and S. Currie; Campbell, Arthur, Kinghorn, Brighton and Allen.

Callies: T. Gilmour; G. Abbott and W. E. Williscroft; D. McIlravy, J. H. Kelly and J. Martin; J. Stewart, R. Davis, S. D. Macdonald, A. Murray T. Gray. The merchants won the toss and chose to play into the city goal, Macdonald setting the ball rolling shortly after the scheduled time. On the Callies first breakaway Gray missed a golden opportunity of opening the score and just to give a taste of what was to follow away raced the Merchants to the other end where Kinghorn made no mistake giving his team the lead shortly after five minutes play. The Callies, however, were not long on getting on level terms, Macdonald scoring with a hook shot. Play now ruled fairly even but with the Merchants always showing more judgment and after some nice play they again took the lead, while shortly afterwards they went still further ahead, Brighton being the marksman. Through the Merchants' goalkeeper handling the ball outside his area the Callies the Merchants were awarded a foul. Stewart took the kick and passing nicely to Macdonald, the centre again beat Youngman. This was all the scoring in the first half, the Merchants thus crossing over with a lead of 3 goals to 2.

Hopes of the Callies improving their position were entertained as they now had to play into the best goal and their play at the commencement of the second half certainly pointed to better results but with a lacking of combined effort in the forward rank they could never force home their attacks. On the other hand the Merchants, with more cohesion, kept the Callies defence stretched all the game. All the scoring in the second half was done by the Merchants, who helped themselves to other four goals, although on the run of play they were hardly value for such a score. The Merchants thus won a very good game by the score of 7 goals to 2, and became entitled to hold the City Cup for one year.

RUPERT BALL TEAM SHUT OUT KETCHIKAN

Splendid Exhibition With Only One Run Scored—Attendance, 2,500

Prince Rupert won a great ball game yesterday, and all the old fans who haven't seen a real ball game in years were enthused over it. Rupert won, too, and the Ketchikan halibut hookers who were touted to be the greatest ball team on the coast had to go home content with a shut out and a determination to have revenge on Saturday, the Stars and Stripes day.

Rupert got one. It was a real one, batted out by Irvine in the first inning and it was good for a complete circuit. The ball never came back.

The halibut hookers had Engle, who pitched Vancouver for the pennant two years, in the box. He had a great twirl but lacked speed. He was great on head work, however, and saved a run or two in the sixth when Rupert had a pawn on the second and third bags, with one out and two heavy batters coming up. Engle fanned them both.

In the eighth the hookers looked dangerous. They had the first and second covered with only one gone. Reyes knocked out a heavy one to deep centre and Blake picked it and made a double into Tobey, retiring the side.

Rupert's work on the field was much better than usual although the field did not have very much to do. Somebody picked up a battery at the Rose Festival and it was a good one. Moreland and Irvine are popular citizens of Rupert today. They won the game. The former struck out thirteen men and the latter made the only run of the game.

It is estimated that there were over 2,500 people on the grounds and everyone of them was satisfied they had seen a great game of ball. The crowd was well behaved and applauded both sides unostentatiously.

The visitors were first class ball players and good sports.
