STEAMS 1,500 MILES IN A STRAIGHT LINE

Officers of Senator Did Not Notice Slightest Variation in Compass

Seattle, June 29.—Practically 1,500 miles without a single, solitary change in the compass, which means that the vessel travelled in a straight line for that distance, was the amazing record established by the Pacific Coast Steamship company's steamship Senator on her voyage down from Behring Sea. Perfect weather conditions, with a total absence of winds, seas or currents, were chiefly responsible for the remarkable feat, but credit must also be given to the seamanship of Capt. J. E. Guptill, the master, and his officers.

Fifty miles south of Unimak Pass, Capt. Guptill shaped a course for a point four miles off Carmanah Light, Vancouver Island, 1,492 miles to the south. Not once in steaming the 1,492 miles was the ship's compass changed a single degree. Each day at noon Capt. Guptill took the vessel's position and found that she was churning along in a straight line, so he held her to the course originally shaped out. He was curious to see the result. The Senator arrived three and a half miles off Carmanah Light. She had held day and night to the straight line.
